ALTHOUGH the Olympic games still are two years off, Canadians are not to be caught napping again and hardly a meet or tourney is held nowadays but what the idea of looking over likely material is not uppermost. A system to produce clean young athletes and points takes time to get installed and more time to produce results but it pays to keep the Olympic games always in mind and for this reason, the C. A. A. U. has a general committee already formed. Broadly outlined, it is planned to hold sectional meets with the winners to congregate into a training camp for the finals, such as were held in Montreal in 1924. Just while on that meet, one of the youngsters who showed up so well there is now one of the leading sprinters of the Middle States. His name is Hester, a young Canadian from Ontario, and you will hear more from him as the days go by. Hester gave Coaffee a thrilling battle for honors in the century, losing by what he claimed to be a foul. We mention this to show it takes time to develop a point winner. Hester was an awkward kid at Montreal two years ago. Today, he is rated highly, and undoubtedly will represent Canada at Amsterdam. The bouts on Monday in the Armory were Olympic tests. The coming track and field events this week on the west side are Olympic tests with two promising Saint John candidates, Malcolm and Rubin, entered. So is the girls' meet on June 19. THE sensational winning streak of the Yankees has recalled the two phenomenal strings of victories compiled by the Giants during the season of 1916. Although they finished in fourth place that year, the Giants established two major league records for consecutive victories. They hung up a record of twenty-six consecutive victories, and away from their home grounds. The string of seventeen victories away from home, however, was not included in the list of twenty-six consecutive triumphs, despite the fact that both of these marks were established in the same season. The feat of winning the seventeen contests away from home was accomplished from May 9 to 29, 1916, while the twenty-six consecutive victories were gained at the Polo Grounds from Sept. 7 to 30. In winning seventeen consecutive games away from their home grounds the Giants surpassed by one game the previous major league record established by the Senators from May 30 to June 18, 1912. This still stands as the American League record. In gaining their twenty-six triumphs in succession later in the season of 1916 the Giants surpassed by seven games the mark made by the Chicago White Sox, who won nineteen games in a row from Aug. 2 to 23, 1906. Heavy Hitter Now In Slump



Jim Bottomley is as scintillating as ever around first base for the St. Louis Cardinals. But one reason, perhaps, why the usually hard hammering St. Louis outfit is trying hard to break into first division instead of battling it out with the Reds and Cubs for the lead is that Bottomley is not hitting.

Bottomley is, by tradition and record, a .300 hitter. He has hit over that mark ever since he broke into baseball with the Mitchell club of the South Dakota League in 1920.

When he broke into the big time with the Cards five years ago big league pitching failed to bother him. The season of 1922, his first with the National Leaguers, he hit .325 in 37 games. And the next, over a span of 137 he turned in the remarkable average of .371. In 1924 he hit .316 and last year .367.

This year he is hitting some 25 points under the charmed circle margin.
