

Evening Vocational Classes Received Majority Support At Conference Yesterday

A resolution favoring the continuation of the evening vocational classes in St. John was passed at a conference called by the Rotary Club and held yesterday afternoon in the board of trade rooms with Dr. H. L. Spangler presiding and representatives of the Rotary Club, Board of Trade, Commercial Club, Trades and Labor Council, Women's Council, Women's Canadian Club, the Free Kindergarten Association, the Retail Merchants' Association, and the city council attending. The resolution was carried with seventeen yeas and ten nays. An amendment endorsing the action of the mayor and council in withdrawing the vocational grant for the present was lost by a vote of twelve to nine.

When the chairman had explained that the meeting was called to consider the situation as regards the vocational training classes in St. John, Mr. B. J. B. L. Casade, a member of the Rotary Club, said that, following the action of the city council in refusing the grant for vocational training, the classes were to be stopped. He hoped the conference would do away with any prejudices in regard to vocational training and lead to the accomplishment of what was best for the working boys and girls and those who were taking the classes.

"Vocational training is designed for two classes of persons: (1) the boys and girls of high school age who desire training for the industries or for home making; (2) the working boys and girls who have left school, and older persons who desire to increase their efficiency as producing factors or home-makers in the community, and whose early education was neglected.

"If St. John had a properly designed and equipped vocational high school it would serve the purpose of both classes as day and evening schools could both be conducted under its roof. That is not to say that the classes for the boys and girls of high school age are not reason whatever for refusing to provide evening classes for those who need and desire and older persons who need and desire

Health Authorities Are Back of Campaign to Prevent Disease.

The familiar "swat the fly" slogan is now being revised by health authorities. The new slogan is being advised to "swat the cold" in winter as heartily as they "swatted" the fly in summer.

The province. He was sure there would be all the money that was needed if a decision was arrived at as to what was required. He urged an investigation, the establishment of a day school where boys might have the equivalent of an apprenticeship, and of evening classes where men and boys, over seven years of age might receive an extension of trade training and of evening classes. He advocated the bringing of vocational training into the direction of the board of education.

Mr. Belding reminded the meeting that the resolution under discussion was whether he favored the continuance of evening vocational classes. Reforms in the board or in the act could be made, but the resolution was to be decided by the board of education.

Mr. Belding asked whether vocational evening classes if continued would be under the same control as the day classes, or whether they would and perhaps they would not.

Dr. A. E. Emery, chairman of the vocational committee said the committee had done the best that it could with the funds at its disposal. The 700 classes of the first year had all been satisfied that they had benefited by the classes. This year there were fewer classes but since the city had refused to vote money to the committee the schools must close. He thought if the board of education would carry on the department of the vocational classes might have been carried on.

At the request of the mayor Dr. Emery explained that the committee had been asked for \$25,000 and not for \$1.

Mr. W. Edmond Raymond spoke as the representative of the vocational committee appointed after nomination by the Women's Council. She said she had no knowledge of the Vocational Institute of St. John and had no knowledge of its active existence for more than one year. She said however, that the greatest specialized single-handed industry and all the big things of the world depended on the outcome of the home-making and the things of the home-making.

Wants Change in Act.

J. D. P. Lavin, a member of the vocational committee, and of the school board, said he had not seen eye to eye with the vocational committee.

THE BOARD OF ASSESSORS OF THE CITY OF ST. JOHN

Herby give notice that under the provisions of the "Saint John City Assessment Act" it is required that every owner of Personal Property, viz: Stock-in-Trade, Automobiles, Horses, Carriages, Bicycles, Sleighs, Boats, etc., shall make a return of the value of same to the Board of Assessors, and any person neglecting to make return of above mentioned Property will be prosecuted as provided for by the said Act.

ALSO

That all persons Twenty-one years of age and over, shall file a statement of their income received by them in the past year, excepting only, when the total income is included in the return of their Employer. Income from Investments, Dividends and Profits and Income from All Sources, excepting that from Real Estate located in the City of St. John.

These statements must be filed out by the person making same and sworn to before an Assessor, Justice of the Peace or Notary Public, and filed not later than February Tenth at the Office of the Board of Assessors. No person is excused from making a return of statement by failure of the Assessment Department to send them blank forms.

Beginning Thursday, February Third and continuing until February Eleventh, the Council Chamber on the first floor of City Hall will be open to receive these statements.
