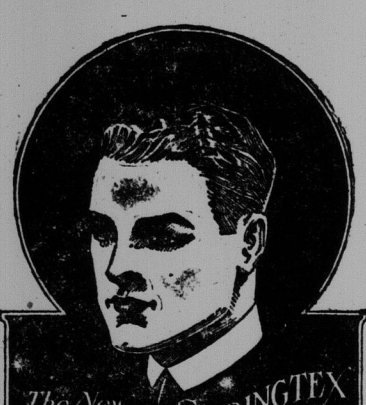

**BOARD OF HEALTH.**  
The regular monthly meeting of the sub-district board of health was held yesterday afternoon at the Y. M. C. A. hall. Miss Edith Haslam, director of the child welfare work of the Y. O. N. and Miss Jessie Forsyth, acting superintendent, read reports. They reported that there was much preventable illness here and suggested a "summer camp for sickly poor children. Miss S. E. Brophy, nurse for the St. John association for the prevention of tuberculosis, reported 222 patients on her list. Dr. T. Fred Johnston, inspector of dairy products, reported in detail upon the premises of milk vendors and recommended withholding licenses from three dealers. The sanitary inspector, Richard Walsh, reported several houses in Douglas Avenue which were drained through wooden sluices at present choked, into Marble Cove. It was decided to notify all property holders whose houses were not on the line of sewerage to install the prescribed sanitary vault. Dr. Warwick was delegated to meet the city commissioners relative to the annual clean-up day and the board voted \$200 for this purpose. Dr. Warwick was also appointed delegate to the public health conference in Toronto to be held this month. Dr. Mabel Hamilton submitted her report on the schools.

**BERRY CASE IS RESUMED**  
Moncton, N. B., May 4—When the adjourned sitting of the Albert county circuit court, with Chief Justice McKeown presiding, resumed yesterday at Hopewell Cape, the case of Ezekiel Berry, charged with the murder of his wife, Minnie Berry, on December 12, was proceeded with. The witnesses called by the crown were George H. Prosser, the complainant's wife, Blanche Prosser, Mrs. Bunyan Bannister and Robert Snowball Colpitts. The evidence in the main was a reiteration of that given by the same witnesses at the preliminary examination. Mrs. Berry, according to the story of the accused, left her home after ten o'clock Saturday night, and on Sunday morning, when he went to search for her, he found her body in a pool where the family got their water. The evidence of George Prosser was that there was no evidence in the snow around the pool that a body had been taken out of it that morning.  
All the witnesses told of seeing marks on the throat of the dead woman and a scratch on her jaw, and they also swore

**FRENCH AMBASSADOR TO VATICAN AT ONCE**
