Wild Time in Cleveland

Cleveland, Oct. 13.—Cleveland paid a tribute to its world champion baseball team in a public demonstration last night in Wade Park, attended by approximately 50,000 people. So great was the enthusiasm that the crowd became uncontrollable and broke through ropes marking off the stage where city officials and the Cleveland American League baseball players sat, smashed chairs, pushed several persons into a small lake, and vociferously expressed its joy over the winners of the world's series.

Several detachments of the police were powerless and not until long after the lights had been put out and the players and left did the celebration end. Those who were unable to get near the scene of the demonstration.

Moncton in Eastern League

Halifax, Oct. 13.—Nova Scotia amateur hockey league will be organized at a meeting to be held Nov. 1, at Truro. This announcement was made last night by a local player who is promoting the league. Officials of the Crescents have already announced that the club will be represented while Colonel Stan. Bould, president of the Wanderers, intimates that his club will also have a fast team in the league.

Springhill, Amherst and New Glasgow have been invited to enter teams in the league, and there is a possibility that Moncton will be asked to enter, and should the New Brunswickers consent, the league will be known as the "Eastern."

As far as can be learned all above teams are in favor of amateur hockey, although they will attempt to have blacklisted athletes made eligible for competition. It has been pointed out that with some of the veterans and former professionals back in the amateur game the league will be a huge financial success, the first season, and that the money could be expended to make the league stronger for future years.

American Association

Calumet, Mich., Oct. 14.—The American Hockey Association will be reorganized this year with Calumet back in. Calumet refused to join the league last year and this action weakened the association considerably. The make-up of the circuit is not definitely known, but it is believed it will include Calumet, Houghton, the two Soos and possibly St. Paul. The entry of the latter city seems to be conditional on the formation of a league on the Iron ranges, possibly including St. Paul, Duluth, Hibbing and Eveleth. If this league is formed, arrangements will be made for a post-season series between the two circuits.
