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MATTERS BEFORE THE PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT

St. John Interest in New Companies—Convictions Under Indian Act

(Special to Times.) Fredericton, Aug. 20—The session of the provincial government was continued this morning. Routine business occupied the time. At 3 o'clock this afternoon delegations will be heard with regard to the contemplated construction across the Nashwaak River at Mayville by the Nashwaak Pulp & Paper Company.

Fraser Companies, Limited, which holds extensive timber lands on the Nashwaak, wishes assurance that proper facilities will be provided for running the Fraser logs over the dam. Riparian owners also are expected to appear. It is expected that the Nashwaak Pulp & Paper Company can make arrangements satisfactory to all.

Albert Murray, Winter, Mrs. Elmina Winter and Francis Kerr, all of St. John, have been incorporated as the Peerless Laundry Co., Ltd., with capital stock of \$5,000 and head office in St. John.

LABOR MATTERS IN CITY Union Officials Report Seventy-Five Per Cent. Organized

The assertion that seventy-five per cent of the men regularly employed in manual work in St. John are organized in trades unions was made this morning by F. A. Campbell, president of the Trades and Labor Council of the Association. They said that the union movement has been growing steadily in St. John and that the only important classes of workers not organized were the textile workers, laundrymen and tanners.

There are now forty-three unions affiliated with the Trades and Labor Council, in addition to others which are not affiliated. Since the beginning of this year fourteen new unions have been organized and affiliated with the council and three others also organized but not affiliated.

THE HARBOR There was an informal discussion of the harbor commission proposals in the mayor's office this morning when E. W. Wignam, M. P., called to see His Worship. In the course of the discussion the city chamberlain referred to statement that the sinking of the fund had been raised by general taxation and did not come from harbor revenue, and therefore had no more relation to the price the government should pay than any other of the city's assets.

SPANIARDS TO BUY WAR MATERIAL IN FRANCE Paris, Aug. 19—The Spanish government, it is announced, is sending a mission to France to buy excess war material.

Fire Chiefs' Convention Calgary, Aug. 20—With more than fifty fire chiefs in attendance, the fire chiefs' convention opened here yesterday with Chief Pritchard of Chatham, Ont., presiding. One of the principal papers of the day was by Mrs. Pritchard, on carelessness in the home, which was responsible for many fires.

Two men charged with drunkenness were remanded. Scott F. Murrell notes that a minor case against Albert Frost he laid over until Monday afternoon at two o'clock. This was agreed to.

THE U. S. SENATE AND THE LEAGUE OF NATIONS Washington, Aug. 20—Four reservations on the League of Nations covenant are embodied in a separate resolution prepared today by Senator Pittman of Nevada, democratic member of the foreign relations committee, for introduction in the senate.

Senator Pittman said the reservations made by President Wilson that if reservations are to be made they should be embodied in a separate resolution and not in the resolution of ratification, which might make new negotiations necessary. Senator Pittman said the reservations had not been submitted to the president. They are similar to those proposed by a group of seven Republican senators and deal with the right of withdrawal from the league, Article 10, domestic questions and the Monroe doctrine.

MAY BE MURDER CHARGE AGAINST HUN HEINRICH Lille, France, Aug. 20—(French Wireless Service)—Evidence adduced before the French military court inquiring into crimes committed by the Germans during the occupation, indicate that a charge of murder may be brought against von Heinrich, a former military governor of Lille.

Testimony against von Heinrich was given yesterday by Mesdames Jacques and Martens, widows of men shot by the Germans. It was testified that after sentence of death had been passed on Jacques and Martens, von Heinrich ordered the lawyers of the condemned men to appeal to the German emperor. While the appeal was being made, von Heinrich, it was declared, ordered that the men be executed and they were shot twenty-four hours later.

CHOLERA OUTBREAK ON ISLAND OF FORMOSA Tokio, Aug. 17—(By the Associated Press)—Cholera has broken out on the island of Formosa, and the government has declared a quarantine against the island. More than 200 cases of cholera are said to have been found.

MONTENEGRINS AND SERBIANS REPORTED IN SEVERE FIGHT Rome, Aug. 20—Severe fighting between Montenegrins and Serbians near Lake Scutari was reported in news agency despatches received here today. Serbians were said to be evacuating what was formerly Montenegro and to have massacred inhabitants of the Carnizza region. It was said the Serbians burned houses and drove the fleeing inhabitants toward Beria with the intention of intercepting them there.
