Monticello, N. Y., Sept. 4.-William
Rappagood of Jersey City was killed and
thirteen other persons were injured when
an auto-bus carrying thirty members
of a Hopkinton, N. J., club, got be-
yond control while descending a moun-
tain road in Sullivan county and rolled
over a steep embankment. Elizabeth
Schultz of Jersey City was caught un-
der the overturned car and crushed. She
died.

The party left Jersey City for an out-
ing at Fort Verde. The bus was de-
scribed as a small, unimproved, and
Wurtsboro when the brakes refused to
work and the car became unmanage-
able.
