C. F. CRANDALL HAS RETURNED TO MONTREAL

Has Sold His Interest in the
Vancouver Daily World.

Montreal, Sept. 7. — C. F. Crandall, president of the Dominion News Bureau and formerly managing editor of the Star, has returned to Montreal from Vancouver, where for the last year he has been publisher of the Vancouver Daily World. He has sold his interest in that newspaper and will reside in Montreal.

Mr. Crandall reports improving business conditions on the coast. The revival of the lumber industry and the harvesting of a bumper wheat crop marked the turn of the commercial tide and ensures a rapid resumption of prosperous growth throughout the whole western country.

Mr. and Mrs. Crandall made the trip from Vancouver to Montreal by motor, coming most of the way through the U. S.

Mr. Crandall was formerly a newspaper man in St. John. His wife was formerly Miss Maud Fairall of this city.

THREW HOT SOUP OVER WIFE In Retaliation She Accuses Him of Being Man Sought for Shooting.

New York, Sept. 7. — Cross wires over a late dinner led Frank Danano, a twenty-one-year-old dock worker, to throw a pot of hot soup over Romy, his wife, in the kitchen of their home, on the second floor of 190 Orchard street, on Sunday evening. Detective Mitchell arrested Danano, and he was locked up at police headquarters.

Mrs. Danano is seventeen years old. She had just put her six-month-old baby down when the soup was thrown. It caught her in the back, and she was painfully burned. Then she accused her husband of being the man who on April 28 last shot Frank Camerino in a fight in Brooklyn. Camerino is still in the hospital, and the police have been looking for his assailant.

GREEK REGRETS KILLING OF ITALIAN AT PIRAEUS

Rome, Sept. 7. — Advice from Athens says that the Greek premier yesterday visited the Italian legation and expressed deep regret over the killing of an Italian soldier and the wounding of another Italian at Piraeus.

The premier assured the minister that the men who attacked the Italian would be punished and that the families of the victims would be compensated.

C. P. R. TRAIN HITS AUTO TWO PEOPLE KILLED

Chesterville, Ont., Sept. 6. — Two are dead and three others are injured, following a collision between an automobile and the C. P. R. Montreal-Chicago flyer, near here yesterday. The dead, George Murray, aged thirty-three, Mrs. Helen Reynolds, aged forty. All were from South Bombay, N. Y.

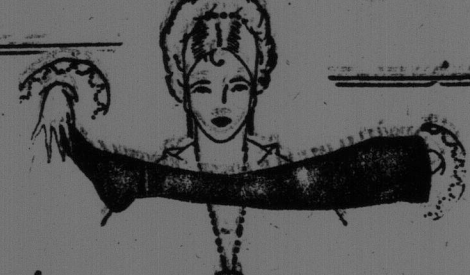
