

HOME ELECTIONS.

Intense Excitement in the Streets of London—Vehicular Traffic is Suspended.

The Majority of the Crowd Everywhere Seem Conservative in Sympathy.

H. M. Stanley, Conservative, African Explorer, Captures North Lambeth.

Latest Returns Show the Results to be a Liberal Route—Press Comments.

London, July 15.—The total results of the parliamentary elections, which have been made up to tonight, are as follows: Conservatives, 151; Liberal-Unionists, 21; Liberals, 23; Parnellites, 4; McCarthyites, 4; Labor, 1. Total, 204. As compared with the parliament which has just been dissolved, 24 seats thus returned show gains for the Liberals, and five for the Conservatives. There is intense excitement in the streets of London over the result of the elections. The theatres and restaurants are almost deserted. Early in the evening a tremendous crowd gathered in front of the National Liberal Club, where the results were thrown from a great screen by a stereopticon. The club house itself was crowded early. Most of the prominent members were present. A large notice was displayed in the club lobby stating that the members who were absent were canvassing for the elections and asking others willing to assist to communicate with the secretary. The results were announced in the smoking room, where a special wire had been placed. The news as it was received was posted on a large blackboard. Many country members came to town to learn how the tide of the election was running. The members of the club were mostly glum and dispirited. Outside the club house the crowd greeted the news of the election of John Burns, the labor leader, who recently made a tour of America, with tremendous cheers. The bulletin announcing Henry M. Stanley's election was received with hisses, and cries of "professional politician." The pictures of Mr. Gladstone and Sir Wm. Harcourt, which were thrown upon the scene from time to time, were wildly cheered. The windows in the adjoining Hotel Metropole were thronged with fashionably dressed men and women who were enjoying the scene.

Before attending the state ball, the Prince of Wales drove to the Carlton Club and scanned the bulletins. They were posted in the lobby, where a throng of members were gathered in a jubilant and exultant mood. The results were received with immense enthusiasm. At the Constitutional Club so great were the crowds that gathered outside that the doors were closed, but the result, posted in the lobby were plainly seen by the outsiders. Immense throngs surged through Fleet street this evening. The results of the elections have been placarded as fast as received at the newspaper offices. All vehicular traffic was suspended. Some Conservative gains were hissed and hooted, but the majority of the crowd everywhere seem to be Conservative in their sympathy.

It is announced this evening that John Macleod, who is a candidate for re-election as a Liberal from Sutherland, has offered to retire in favor of Sir William Harcourt. Much excitement followed the announcement of the results of the various London elections. This was especially so at North Lambeth, where the counting station there was an enormous noisy crowd. The announcement that Henry M. Stanley had been elected was received with enthusiastic cheering mingled with hissing. When Mr. C. P. Trevelyan, his opponent, left the building he was received with a great ovation. Mr. Stanley with his wife followed, receiving a mixed reception, and drove away quickly in a cab to the Conservative Club, where he addressed a crowd of his supporters from a window and thanked them for the honor of his election.

London, July 17.—At ten o'clock last night the result of the general elections was as follows: Conservatives, 165; Unionists, 23; total 189. Liberals, 29; Parnellites, 4; McCarthyites, 12; Labor, 1; total, 46. The net Unionist gains up to this hour are 20 seats.

Sir William Vernon Harcourt, the Liberal leader, who was recently defeated by Mr. C. Drage, Conservative, in Derby, has accepted the offer of Mr. C. N. Warrington, Q. C., who was recently nominated to stand for West Meamouthshire, to retire in his favor. There was to be no opposition to the candidacy of Mr. Warrington and Sir William will be nominated in his place to-morrow.

The Chronicle (Liberal) says this morning that it does not share in the enthusiasm for an immediate return of Sir W. Harcourt, adding: "We should almost have counselled a temporary retirement to his own fireside, if his renewed leadership of the party is to be a plague of a local vetoist policy. We should like a little time to reflect upon the situation."

Up to the parliamentary elections show the following results: Conservatives, 200; Liberal-Unionists, 31; total Unionist, 231. Liberals, 44; Parnellites, 4; McCarthyites, 12; Labor, 1; total 292. The gains which the Unionists have secured in the elections thus far held insure them a majority of 32 in the next house, even if the remainder of the seats to be voted on remain the same as heretofore. The proportion of the electors who went to the polls was higher than on any former occasion.

The superiority of the Unionists was manifest both by the magnitude of their own majorities and by the extent to which they pulled down their opponents. Dadabhai-Naoorji, the Liberal member for the central division of Pinar, who was once referred to by Lord Salisbury as "the black man" (he being an East Indian), was defeated, while his fellow countryman, Brownagore, won a seat for the Conservatives. Lord Salisbury's youngest son, Lord Hugh Cecil, has been returned for Greenwich. A Labor member, Wm. R. Cromer, who sat for the Haggerston division of Shoreditch and who recently made a journey to America to urge the adoption of an arbitration treaty, has been unseated, but the chief event of the day was the dismissal of Postmaster-General Morley, making the fourth ex-minister in Lord Rosebery's cabinet who has been sent to seclusion.

In Northampton, which is deemed a Radical stronghold, Henry Labouchere's majority was greatly reduced and the Conservatives won the other seat. The big Unionist majorities in Birmingham and Ashton Manor indicate that the Liberal-Unionists continue to be the most important factor in politics. The re-election of Speaker Gully has elicited congratulations all around. A number of the Unionists supported him on the ground that a member chosen as Speaker ought not to be disturbed. The Liberals bitterly reproached Hon. A. J. Balfour for giving continuance to the opposition to his candidacy, declaring that it is unprecedented. The results of last evening were so convincing that there has been little enthusiasm in public places to-day. The clubs showed a paucity of attention. But the scenes of yesterday were repeated in Fleet street. Crowds gathered in front of the newspaper offices and there was much cheering at Conservative gains. Contrary to expectations, Rt. Hon. Joseph Chamberlain's election seemed to delight the populace, but was received with sullenness at the Liberal clubs.

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In Dorset west division Col. E. Williams, Con., and in King's county, Birr division, Bernard C. Molloy, Lib., have been returned unopposed. The Daily News, the Liberal organ, says: "The result in Derby surprised even the local Tories. Sir William Harcourt and his colleagues were floated out on beer. In other constituencies the efforts of publicans and brewers, with the alliance of the militant section of the clergy, contributed largely to the same effect. There is plenty of cause for the Tories triumph, but there is little cause for Liberal discouragement and none whatever for despair. We are used to it; had beginning. There is not a step of Liberal progress which is not taken over the stepping stones of defeat."

It ascribes the Liberal defeat in Lancashire to the scandalous misrepresentations of the government's policy on the Indian cotton duties, which were made in leaflets sent broadcast through the country. The Chronicle says: "We congratulate the Unionists upon having drawn first blood at the empire's cost. They have played anti-imperial and anti-national games for votes of Liberals and have managed to win two seats, owing in some measure to the socialist federation, who gained no result for themselves. Their polls were small and contemptible."

The labor candidates at Saturday's elections, having no hope of their success, cast the Liberals their seats. In return, it is likely that Keir Hardie, the labor champion in the house, will be defeated by the abstention or the active hostility of the Irish voters in his constituency.

Dun who was elected in Limerick the other day, is in Portland prison for dynamite outrages, and he will be denied a seat. John Parnell is the Redmondite candidate in Meath. At a meeting of his McCarthyite opponents an old letter concerning him from his brother, Charles Stewart Parnell, was read by a priest. It was written in 1888, and began as follows: "I cannot recommend my brother John as a candidate for Conington. Carlow or any other Irish constituency, as I do not think he would make a suitable representative."
