SEARCHING FOR GAS.
A well is being sunk on the Woodbridge farm, Colchester township, for the purpose of ascertaining whether there is another gas belt in South Essex. Experts claim that the gas belt in Ohio is not the same as the one in Essex county. It is shown that the wells already discovered in Essex are bored down just as far as the "mud" goes, in most cases about 1200 feet. This is said to show that the "belt" is independent of the one in Ohio, as that belt would be in the latter country, and the surface by the time it reached the Canadian shore. The company putting down the new well will drill to a depth sufficient to strike the Ohio belt, should it exist. The new well is not in the South Essex belt, and experts are watching the outcome with much interest.

AFTER A DESERTER.
On Sunday the park was enlivened by the somewhat unusual sight of the historic searchers, enclosing the stables of two of the regulars from the Leinster regiment who were here from Halifax, N. S., on their way to Sarnia to identify a deserter arrested there, and convey him back to the regimental headquarters. They examined the captured deserter, and after being told of the unfortunate accident which occurred with it, recounted a similar case in England when a soldier's arm was blown off above the elbow, through careless handling of it. They had been asked to identify the deserter, and gave a graphic description from personal observation of the raising of the black flag in the latter country, during the queen's jubilee. One of the men lowered himself by a rope and tore the discolored emblem down. He would have been torn to pieces by the mob, had not the soldiers rescued him. A large subscription was raised for him, but for his own safety, he had to be removed to Ireland. The soldiers describe the Irish cavalry as fully equal to the home regiments, or any other. They were very cordially received on their journey, especially in Montreal, and noted the wonderful crops and fertility of the soil when they entered Kent. They were very intelligent observers and much gratified by the friendly tone of the people of Chatham.
