A Dawson Paper Tabulates the Receipts for the Past Seven Months.

The Yukon Midnight Sun has the follow

ing in regard to the Yukon revenues for the past seven months: By scanning the items as given below, it will be seen that mining is the most important source of revenue from this district. But the total from this source is perhaps not greater than the amount colected by import at the summits of the Chilcoot and White passes. The revenue from mines and miners is shown in the amounts collected from certificates, miners' licenses and the royalty. sources show a total of \$442,747. The other sources of revenue dwindle into insignificance when compared with these two. Customs at Dawson have amounted to but \$38,000 during the seven months ending August L. The royalty tax does not by any means represent one-tenth of the gold taken out last winter. The law exempts from this tax all chains yielding less than \$2,500. Then the inspectors, J. D. McGregor and Captain H. Norwood, exercised lemency, often revoking the tax where proof was shown that a mine was operated without profit. So it can be said that ten-Justoms at Dawson have amounted to but

without profit. So it can be said that ten-times the royalty represents the total output. The revenue sent to Ottawa a few days ago, in two drafts, was \$526,145.65, credited to the following sources: Sale of lots in Dawson......\$ 28.45 Jiquor permits..... Dertificates and licenses issued by the gold commissioner..... rown timber account..... Koyalty on gold product..... 351,783 00

Total ......\$526,145 65 "In addition to the above the Northwest Territorial government has received \$24,000 on saloon licenses."

NEW WESTMINSTER.

Fish Commissioner Little, of Tacoma, will direct the attention of the officials at the Chinook hatchery toward spring sal-mon exclusive'v next year. An effort mon exclusive'y next year. will be made with this hatchery as a starting point to increase the run of spring salmon on the Columbia river, where it has decreased 50 per cent, He will ask for an appropriation to establish a hatchery on the head waters of the river. Mr. Little says there is very little, if any, illegal fishing done along the river. The season opens on the Col-umbian on September 10. A heavy run

of fall salmon is expected. Sir William Fraser, of Edinburgh, has left all his property, valued at over \$500,000, for charitable and educational purposes. The sum of \$125,000 is to be devoted to building houses for indigent families, preferably authors and artists. The University library receives \$50,000, two-thirds of which is to be devoted to an increase of the salaries of the officials.
