**Natural History Stories
Told Boys and Girls**
The Kangaroo



Why is a kangaroo?
In other words, why are the fore-
legs of this strange Australian ani-
mal so much shorter than its hind-
legs?
This question has never been satis-
factorily answered, except that when
pursued it can make much more
speed hopping than it can running.
The stork usually brings one baby
to mamma kangaroo, but sometimes
she is presented with twins, and on
rare occasions with triplets. You'd be
surprised to see how small and deli-
cate these babies are when the stork
first brings them. A baby kangaroo is
smaller than many bugs and in
most cases less than an inch in size.
Yet full grown kangaroos when stand-
ing on their hind legs, are seven feet
tall.
When these baby kangaroos first
come into the world they are blind,
and like many wee babies you have
seen are utterly devoid of hair or
fur. They are just as helpless as hu-
man babies, and for that reason the
mother kangaroo has a pouch near
her breast in which she carries her
babies until they are old enough to
help themselves. The young stay in
this pouch for weeks and sometimes
for months. Occasionally they hop
out of the pouch just to show the
mother how big they are getting.
When anything scares them they
jump back into mother's pouch, their
heads only peeping out to see what's
going on.
Cape Cook first discovered the kan-
garoo in 1770, and gave it the name
by which it is known all over the
world. There are neither deer nor an-
telopes in Australia, and the kan-
garoo takes the place of those timid
animals, for the kangaroo is even tam-
er than the deer, but if any human
being or animal is after him he can
get away even quicker than a deer.
The tail of the kangaroo is rigid,
and it is a funny sight to see him
sit erect on a tripod formed by the
tail and the two hind legs. This seems
his favorite mode of resting. Ordin-
arily the distance of each leap made
by a kangaroo exceeds its total length,
but when pursued and going at full
speed, each leap may be four times
its length. These animals are often
hunted in the open fields, plains and
forests, where they live, and the gen-
tleness of them will become enraged
when a dog overtakes him. Then the
kangaroo defends itself by landing a
powerful kick with one of its hind feet
which has a powerful claw on its
fourth toe. This claw will cut a dog
like a sword, and the average hound
is usually dispatched at one blow.
Kangaroos make good playmates,
and Australian boys and girls often
have them as pets on their premises.
They are gentle, kind and inoffensive
and unless abused they will do no
harm to any living thing.

**KING LOOKS
OVER MOAT**

**New Approach to Hampton
Court Thrown Open for Use
of Public—Not in Original
Palace.**

London, Nov. 3.—The king and
queen visited Hampton Court and in-
spected Henry VIII's recently un-
covered bridge and moat in front of
the west entrance to the palace. Their
majesties asked many questions in
relation to the work and were under-
stood to have cordially approved of
all that had been done. The board-
ings were then removed and the new
approach to the palace thrown open to
the inspection of the public.
The moat and bridge were not in
the original palace of Cardinal Wol-
sey, but were added by Henry VIII
in 1525, when he altered as much of
the building as possible in order to
emphasize the change of ownership.
The moat and bridge were in position
until the reign of William III, when
that utilitarian monarch caused them
to be removed. Two years ago it was
discovered that the moat had not been
destroyed, but had merely been filled
up, while the bridge was not pulled
down but buried. The work of ex-
cavation was begun and the result
was entirely satisfactory. The brick
work of the moat wall as well as the
stone work of the bridge were found
in good preservation in spite of hav-
ing been buried for over two cen-
turies. During the excavations
plenty of the thin flat Tudor bricks of
which the palace was built were un-
earthed; these were put aside and
have been used in the repair of the
damaged surfaces.
The work of restoration has been
executed under the direction of Ed-
win Lutyens, the architect, and the
work of the restoration has been car-
ried out by the workmen of the
palace, by his own staff of workmen,
and so faithfully has it been carried
out that the eye is hardly able to dis-
tinguish the new masonry from that
of the old, and when the masonry
on the parapets and embrasures has
been toned down a little, it will be difficult
to tell where one ends and the other
begins. On either side of the fine
stone bridge which now spans the
moat in front of the west entrance to
the palace, stand five octagonal col-
umns and upon these heraldic
"bootes" are to be placed. Every
detail has received the close atten-
tion of the committee of experts ap-
pointed by the office of works to su-
pervise the restoration, and the hope
is held that every reason to be sat-
isfied with the result.

Fasten Flowers

To wear a cluster of flowers or a
single blossom on a tailor-made coat,
sew a little loop of heavy braid under-
neath the collar lapel with the ends
sewed together at the outer edge, just
under the buttonhole.
In this way flowers can be attached
without sticking a pin into delicate
cloth just where it will show most.
It is a plain, adopted by me also for
their buttonholes, and a very useful
one.

Embroidery

In most of the embroidery designs
for blouses the sleeves are omitted
from the scheme, but occasionally a
slender motif is placed on the outside
of the arm, from elbow to shoulder,
which adds not a little to the beauty
of the garment.
Acorns are realistically brought out
in embroidery by padding the acorn
heavily and doubly padding the cap,
the last layer of stitches on the latter
being laid diagonally some distance
apart.

Plant Pots

To prevent plant pots from leaving
a mark on a table or shelf, try this
plan: First lay a linen cloth, if you
wish to use one, on the table; then
place upon it a piece of plain window-
glass cut to fit the table. The flower-
pots and saucers may rest safely on
the glass which is easily cleaned
whenever necessary.
