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WESTERN WHEAT CROP IN U. S. BADLY INJURED

New York Market Firm on Light Trading--Canadian Loan for \$100,000,000 Arranged.

New York, July 25--The market continued firm on light trading during the afternoon. In most cases the best prices of the day were made near the close and some net gains were scored. The weekly crop weather report showed damage to spring wheat in part of North Dakota and serious losses in this crop in nearly all states west of there but excellent indications elsewhere.

An offer of settlement to the striking copper miners of the Butte district afforded some hope that the widespread labor troubles in that industry might be settled. A Canadian government loan of \$100,000,000 has been arranged with New York bankers to be secured largely on Canadian Pacific securities and will be offered shortly. The money market remained quiet and call rates low.

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
