Jack Johnson Must Face The Music

"Unconditional Surrender" Only Basis on Which Federal Authorities Will Treat With Negro Pugilist.

Chicago, Jan. 29.—"Unconditional surrender" is the only basis on which local Federal officials will treat with Jack Johnson, negro pugilist. This announcement was made by District Attorney Frank P. Cline after reading the Associated Press dispatch from Mexico City to the effect that Johnson planned to return to the United States and face his prison sentence. Johnson fled to Europe in 1913 while out on bail. Johnson's indictment was the result of charges that he paid the railroad fare of a woman from Pittsburgh to Chicago, and he was sentenced to one year in the penitentiary and fined \$1,000.

MARITIME AND MAINE SHORT SHIP CIRCUIT

Representatives of Trotting Association Arranged a 13 Weeks' Schedule at Fredericton Yesterday.

Fredericton, N. B., Jan. 29.—The Maritime and Maine Short Ship Circuit representatives arranged for thirteen uninterrupted weeks of harness racing for 1920 at their meeting here today, exclusive of the week of July 1st (Dominion Day), when there will be several race meetings at provincial towns on the circuit.

The circuit will thus open at Houlton, Me., on July 5th and thence the remaining dates for the circuit show weeks allotted as follows: Woodstock, N. B., July 12th; St. Stephen, N. B., July 19th; Fredericton, N. B., July 26th; Chatham, N. B., August 2nd; Moncton, N. B., August 9th; Springhill, N. S., August 16th; Sussex, N. B., August 23rd; Fredericton, N. B., August 30th; Chatham, N. B., September 6th; St. Stephen, N. B., September 13th; Woodstock, N. B., September 20th; Moncton, N. B., September 27th.

Any proposals to change dates must be made on or before March 10th, and about March 15th another meeting of the executive of the circuit will be held in Fredericton. Purse and stakes will not exceed \$400, with the exception of the free-forell, for which \$500 may be offered. The standard admission fee will be 75 cents, with grandstand extra, and all meetings will be of at least two days' duration. The circuit approved of the "unbacking" rule, but have wired a suggestion that it should be amended so as to include horses which have not equalled their records, on the same basis as those which have not reduced them.

Delegates were guests at the Fredericton Driving Club's weekly matinee races this afternoon, when half-mile heats were raced for the first time this season at the Trotting Park.
