

this is a strong additional reason for the increase of your contributions at the Offertory, which will be required to the extent of 50 per cent. upon the amount at present collected, without which, it is obvious that the services of a second Assistant cannot be obtained, and the additional Evening Service, so much required, cannot be had. The Church Wardens respectfully suggest, that if the different Members of the Congregation would kindly add to their usual Contributions to the extent required, it would be the easiest possible method of making the desired provision, so easy indeed, that it could scarcely be felt.
