

of the Colony, General Prevost received a communication from the Speaker of the House of Assembly,* conveying to him the thanks of that body, and informing him that a Thousand Guineas had been voted by them for the purchase of a sword and a service of plate, to be presented to him in testimony of their gratitude and approbation.† A similar testimonial to the conduct of General Prevost upon this occasion was given by the Patriotic Fund, who voted him a sword of the value of one hundred pounds, and a piece of plate, of the value of two hundred pounds, “for the distinguished gallantry and military talents which he had displayed.”‡ From the West India Planters and Merchants General Prevost likewise received a piece of plate to the value of three hundred guineas.§

In July, 1805, General Prevost returned to England.|| Soon after his arrival he was created a Baronet, and was subsequently appointed Lieutenant-Governor of Portsmouth.

In February, 1808, he was selected to com-
