Miss Keefer, who always dresses in the garb of a nun travelled about the country and telling a tale of wee, was successful in securing much money. She went to Fort Erie some mon hago, and stayed at the Robat's family, where her kind attention to the babe had won the confidence of its mother, She also helped about the house and made herself agree cable to all. In fact she was 'ne of the med cangenial women the family had ever me', at dashe fully ingratiated herself to their favou. Her departure was marked by the disappearance of the young child, and she was suspected at once. Chief Mains set out at once after her following her footsteps closely. The woman called horself "Sister Magdelene," and wore a cross on her left shoulder. Chief Mains searched in many small towns and finally collected facts that led him to believe that the woman was in the vicinity of Strathroy. Following this clue he came here, and on going to a house about a mile from town, where he learned the woman was staying, found the little child. The woman had received word of his coming in some lasy plainable way, as she had made good her escaps when he arrived. Her disguise and other belongings were found in the house. He also went to Komoka, where she has been living to endeavor to learn some trace of her whereabouts.

Miss Keefer is very slight, about one hundred and ten pounds in weight. She is about fifty years of age, but looks younger. She is a member of a well-known and respectable family, who resided at the east end for many years.
