Royalty Well Represented at Wedding of Ex-Monarch of Portugal.

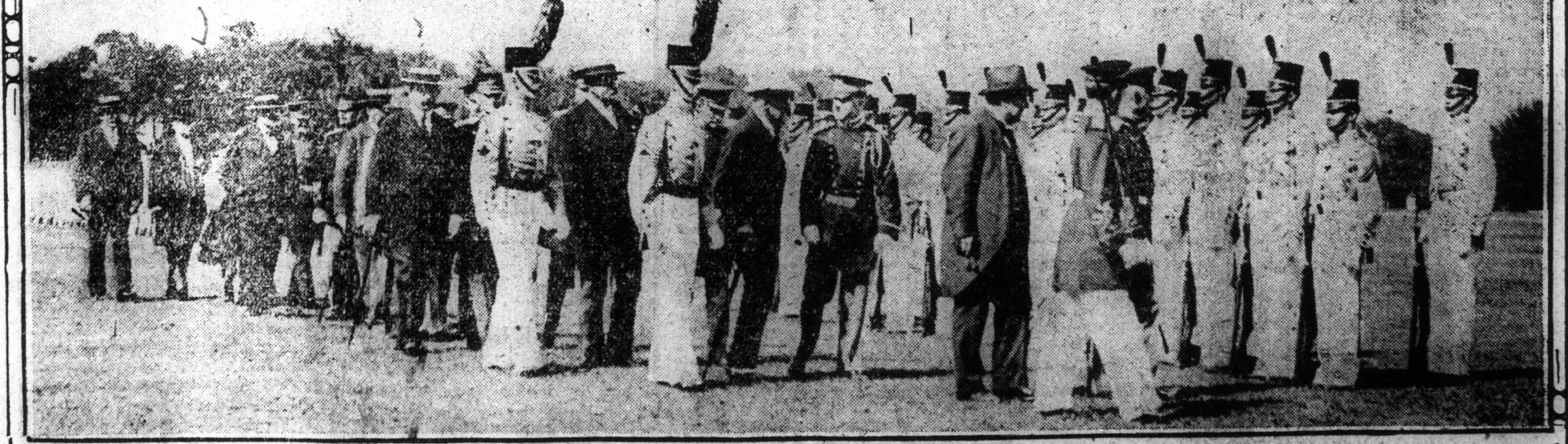

End Is In Sight With G.T.R. Operators

Board of Conciliation Will Settle the Dispute in Question.

BRIEG, Germany, Sept. 4.—Two more officers of the German army's flying corps were killed in an aeroplane accident here to-day. Lieut. Von Eckenbrecher and Lieut. Prinzob, were testing an aeroplane over the military aerodrome when the left wing collapsed while they were at a height of 100 yards. The aviators were thrown to the ground and crushed to death.
