# Turkish Soldiers Fought Bravely

By Special Wire to the Courier.

London, May 20.—Tribute to the fighting ability of the Turks in the three days battle of Achi Baba from May 6 to 8 is paid by the British press representative with the allied forces in the Dardanelles.

"The Turkish soldiers," he says, "fought bravely and with determination. The handling of their artillery was masterly. The Turks dug endless trenches which were located only with extreme difficulty while their machine guns were concealed with their skill in such a prominent feature of German warfare. Nothing could be more remarkable than the manner in which the Turks succeeded in concealing themselves. They were experts in digging themselves in and never disclosing their position by any movement above ground. Their trenches are beautifully made, eight feet deep and extremely narrow, thus rendering effectively the most intense fire from the warships."

## ALLIES HAD GAINED

"It was a battle of the old-fashioned type, where the commanders could direct the movements of their troops by telephone on the basis of what they could watch going on under their eyes. The objective was to reach the heights of Achi Baba. This mountain has a peculiar and forbidding aspect. It closely resembles an old Chinese stool, with a great, round, stupid-looking head, two stout, thick-set shoulders, and two long arms stretching out on either side to the sea. From the hill above the beach a perfect view is obtained of the entire battlefield.

"All the trenches occupied by the allied troops in the firing line, the long lines of supports and the closer formations of reserves were visible. Spectators could watch our every movement on the chess board of war, nor a Turkish gun, nor Turkish trench was visible. Only the allied forces, the English on the left, the French on the right, the British colonial and territorial and the French foreign legion in reserve, were to be seen. Time and again long waves of French colonials swept forward, but no sooner did they leave the shelter of their trenches than the Turks had been lying absolutely quiet opened up a tremendous fire from concealed trenches.

## FURIOUS SHELL FIRE.

"Each day's attacks were preceded by furious shell fire from the warships, but the Turks could not be shaken and our infantry advanced not such an iron ball that the line wavered and then broke. The fire which the Turks developed was undesirable and it was impossible to locate their batteries.

"Describing the third day's fighting he corresponded adds:

"At 5:15 o'clock in the afternoon there suddenly opened from every ship aloft and battering shore the most stupendous bombardment ever witnessed. Fifteen-inch and twelve-inch shells charged with lyddite caused the most terrible explosions, apparently consuming entire hills. Small-caliber shells both lyddite and shrapnel rained every yard of the slopes and sprayed the country between Achi Baba and our trenches; the noise was frightful the hills echoing the detonations of thousands of projectiles.

"The whole region did not have the appearance of being shelled, but it seemed rather as if it had suddenly been set afire. It was covered with a solid bank of yellow, green and white smoke, whence numberless vol-

canoes burst into eruption. The bombardment lasted a quarter hour.

## NOT A TURK VISIBLE.

"Describing the scene of the battle, the correspondent writes:

"According to all preconceived notions, the enemy should have been wiped out and incapable of resisting an infantry advance. Not a single Turk was visible their artillery had not fired a round. Suddenly the guns ceased fire and as one man the entire line of infantry leaped forward to the assault of Krithia.

"BRILLIANT COLONIAL CHARGE

"In spite of all this artillery preparation, however, the enemy was waiting and ready. No sooner had our men emerged from cover than a storm of rifle and machine gun fire was opened on them. But our troops never hesitated. The New Zealanders and Australians particularly charged with bayonets straight into the Turkish line. The manner with which the minor troops went forward never will be forgotten by witnesses who saw them melt away under the dreadful fusillade only to be renewed again as reserves and supports moved forward to replace the fallen.

"At length a point was reached from which no further advance was possible and each man lay down and hid himself in. It became obvious that the attack had spent its force, that a few hundred yards had been won and the hope of taking Krithia by direct assault had to be abandoned."

"Everywhere the allies had gained some ground, but the main object of their attack was not achieved.

## Conscription in Old Land May Yet be Necessary

London, May 20.—Replying to a demand from several members that compulsory military service should be adopted, Harold J. Tennant, under secretary of state for war, said in the House of Commons last evening that the British Government was fully alive to the necessity of mobilizing all resources for the successful conduct of the war.

There were a number of persons, he added who did not realize the gravity of the situation, but the House should weigh well all considerations before it made any attempt to embark on a system of compulsory service. It would only be with reluctance that the Government would embark on such a policy.

The Government, however, Mr. Tennant said in conclusion, realized that such a step might become necessary. He appealed to the House not to press him to say more than that.

EXTEND AGE TO 40.

London, May 20.—An official bulletin issued by the press bureau last night says:

"The Secretary for War announces that new recruits will be accepted up to the age of 40."

## Anton Kuepferle Committed Suicide

 London, May 20.—10:14 a.m.—Anton Kuepferle, who claimed to be an American citizen and who has been on trial charged with giving military information to the enemies of Great Britain, committed suicide last night in Brixton prison. He is reported to have hanged himself.

## FRENCH TROOPS IN ACTION

Paris, May 20.—French troops have been landed at Seddul Bahr, at the southern tip of the Gallipoli peninsula, and on the European side of the Dardanelles, and are now fighting around the Turkish positions at Krithia, according to a despatch received by the Greek newspaper Messenger from Athens.

The French troops are being supported by the French fleet, which is stationed in the bay.

The British forces which departed at Gaba Tepe are directing their action towards Krithia with the object of surrounding the Turks. The attack continues. The battle front at the latter point is three and one half miles in width.

## SUSPEND SERVICES.

 London, May 20.—Swedish steamship companies whose boats ply between Stockholm, Norrkoping, London and Hull have decided to suspend their services owing to the constant interruption to traffic caused by German warships in the Baltic Sea, which have resulted in the serious delays and made trade impracticable.

## EXPRESSED HOPE.

 Tokio, May 20.—Emperor Yoshihito, who formerly opened the diet to-day in the presence of the Princes and ambassadors, expressed the hope that deliberations would be conducted in a spirit of harmony that would assist in bringing about the passage of the needed laws. There are indications that some opposition will develop to the Government's Chinese policy.

 London, May 20.—Sir Ernest Cassel in a letter to The Daily Chronicle, says:

"As many other British subjects of German extraction have given public expression of their feelings, my silence might be misunderstood. Nearly half a century of my life has been spent in England and all my interests—family, business and social—are centred here. All my male relations of military age are serving with the King's forces. My unflinching loyalty and devotion to this country have never varied or been questioned and, while affirming this, I desire to express my deep sense of horror at the manner in which the war is being conducted by the German Government."

## SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

THE sole head of a family, or an male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within five miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead. Price \$300 per acre.

Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after residing homestead patent; also 60 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be substituted where homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$50 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivating 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to re-judge. A crop of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
