Still at the Head. Washington, March 23.—The reduction of \$41,000,000 in the exports of the United States, for the eight months ending with February, is not considered at all discouraging by those interested in the growth of our export trade, nor is it an indication of a decline in the general growth of that trade. On the contrary, in all important articles except three, in which conditions are abnormal, there has been an increase. The decrease is solely, or practically so, in corn, due to the great crop shortage caused by the drouth of last summer; in copper, in which prices have greatly fallen, and in iron and steel manufactures, due to the unusual demand of the home market upon our manufacturers and the reduced demand in foreign markets. In corn and cornmeal alone the exports fall more than \$47,000,000 below those of the corresponding period of last year, while the total decrease in all exports is but \$41,012,584; showing that if corn exports were normal, the total figures would show an increase of more than \$6,000,000 over last year, and over the corresponding period of any preceding year.

CANADA NORTHERN

Railway Bill Received Boost Today

Special to the Daily Nugget. Ottawa, April 8.—The Canada Northern bill was before the railway committee today, when Minister Blair declared the government will do all possible to further construction of the new transcontinental line through northern Canada, to be completed within seven years.

Antimonopoly clauses will be introduced and the question of permitting the enlargement of the capital by ten millions was deferred. The company decided in view of the discovery of a formidable obstacle in the shape of tremendous glaciers, to abandon the Yellow Head Pass. The main line will be built via the north fork of the Fraser or by the Pine river route.

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A Fast Trip.

New York, March 23.—President A. J. Cassatt of the Pennsylvania Railroad, by counsel, John G. Johnson, and three others have broken the running record between Philadelphia and Jersey City by four minutes.

The special train on which they made the remarkable run covered the 90 1/2 miles in exactly eighty minutes. The best previous record was made by J. P. Morgan's special on February 7, which covered the same route in 84 minutes.

Price of Sugar Advanced.

San Francisco, March 23.—The jobbers and refiners of sugar have arrived at an understanding under which all kinds of sugar were advanced yesterday an eighth of a cent per pound. Some time since the refiners broke up a pool on the sugar price and ever since the price of sugar has been the subject of cutting. Jobbers, however have not abandoned their hopes of coming to an arrangement with the refiners. A further advance may be expected shortly.

Boer Sympatizers

The Alaskan Boundary.

London, March 17.—No official information can be obtained respecting negotiations in regard to the Alaskan boundary, but Lord Stratheona, without doubt, has presented the Dominion's case, and the British Foreign Office is striving to effect a settlement. Arbitration is the solution which is probable, since the State Department is not likely to propose the alienation of the territory claimed to have been sold by Russia, and any scheme for a Canadian purchase would be vetoed by the senate at Washington.

Arbitration offers a line of least resistance, and will enable the United States and the Dominion governments to formulate their cases with precision and to accept with good grace some equitable compromise of the frontier question. Negotiations have not reached their final stage, but their trend is in the direction of arbitration as the only practicable method of adjusting this troublesome dispute.

Great Deference Paid to Memory of "Empire Builder" by Those Who Knew Him.

Special to the Daily Nugget. Bulwago, S. A., April 8.—The funeral train conveying the body of Cecil Rhodes arrived at Bulwago today. The town was draped in mourning and the entire population assembled at the railroad station and accompanied the coffin to the drill hall where the body is lying in state. Masses of floral emblems are banked about the bier. Tomorrow his coffin will be taken to the Rhodes' farm in the Matoppo district, whence it will be conveyed on April 10th to a hill called "The Brow of the World." Religious services there will synchronize with memorial service at St. Paul's cathedral in London.

Sue for Peace.

Brussels, March 23.—The Petit Bleu, referring to the arrival at Proctoria of Messrs. Schalkburger, Reits and Commandants Meyer and Kreigh, says that it believes that Mr. Schalkburger's move is in response to fresh British overtures for peace made out of gratitude for the release of Gen. Methuen, and predicts that these overtures will lead to no result unless Boer independence is conceded.

Charleston, S. C., March 23.—April 9 has been set apart as president's day at the exposition. The feature of the day will be the presentation to Maj. Jenkins, by his former chief of the rough riders, of a beautiful sword from the South Carolinians.
