TILBURY VACANCY.

A Letter From the Session and Board of Managers puts the Matter in Another Light

Some further remarks concerning the case referred to in the following letter, will be found on another page of this issue:

Tilbury, July 30.

To the Planet.—In the issue of your paper of the 27th instant there appears an article headed "Indecent Hasten," which is an unwarranted reflection upon the Rev. J. F. Johnston, as well as the Presbyterian congregation in Tilbury. In justice to Mr. Johnston and the congregation the article should be republished as it is an unmitigated falsehood so far as they are concerned, and it is but proper that the public should be placed in possession of the facts.

The article states that when Rev. Mr. McPhail returned from his holiday he found himself supplanted in the hearts of the congregation by Rev. Mr. Johnston. The fact is that on the 17th May last Mr. McPhail was granted three months' leave of absence on account of ill-health, and has never since returned to Tilbury. On the 18th of June last the Rev. Mr. McPhail placed his resignation to the hands of the congregation, this being scarcely more than a week after Mr. Johnston came to supply at Tilbury and before Mr. McPhail knew that Mr. Johnston was supplying. It could therefore hardly be said that Mr. Johnston tried to oust Mr. McPhail from his charge here, or that the congregation tried to pitchfork the former into the latter's place.

The resignation came up at Chatham Presbytery July 10th, and Tilbury congregation was cited to appear at a special meeting of the Presbytery to be held July 24th, when the resignation was accepted and leave was given the congregation to moderate in all to a minister. The whole trouble in Presbytery arose after all this was done, over a motion made to have the next meeting of the Presbytery in two weeks, and it was finally decided to have it in a month's time.

Rev. Mr. Johnston is in no way responsible for the trouble. The Rev. Mr. McPhail, and the unjust and scurrilous attack upon him is wholly without justification or excuse. Had your correspondent or informant been a little less anxious for sensation and a little more considerate of the character of a young man to whom character is everything, he would not have hurried into print until he had first ascertained at least some of the facts of which his article manifests his utter ignorance. FRIGHTFUL RAVAGES

Of the Cholera in Indian Famine Districts.

London, July 31.—The following despatch from the Viceroy of India, Lord Curzon of Kedleston, to the Secretary of State for India, Lord Geo. Hamilton, was received to-day:—Considerable anxiety is felt owing to the weakness of the monsoon. The situation is serious and critical in Gujarat, Baroda and Malabar West, which are not sown. No fodder whatever is available in the south-western part of the Punjab. Sown crops are in imminent danger, as rain continues to hold off. Fodder is scarce and cattle are dying in the central provinces of Thera and Hyderabad. Good crops are possible only in case the monsoon improves.

"One-quarter of the inhabitants of the central provinces are on relief. The total number receiving relief is 6,200,000, with incomplete Bombay figures." The Governor of Bombay telegraphs that there were 8,007 cholera cases in the famine district during the week ending July 21, of which 5,703 resulted fatally. In the native states there were 8,346 cases, 3,510 proving fatal. The total deaths in the famine districts of the British district were 6,755, or 4.25 per 1,000. There has been a good rain fall in North Gujarat and Kathiawar, and a favorable agricultural rainfall and encouraging prospects in the remainder of the affected tracts. The numbers on relief works are decreasing, and gratuitous relief is increasing.

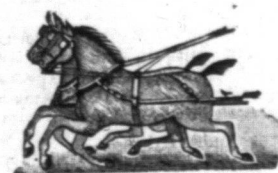

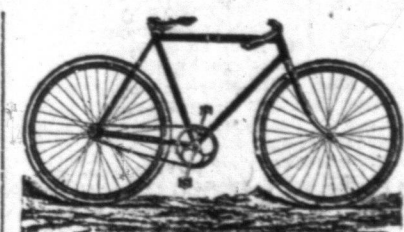
