

After waiting a few days to see if my correction would be made in regard to the statement appearing in the columns of The Planet that the Baden Powell had beaten the Outlaw on a eversal of sailing qualities and had een awarded the flag for last Monlay's race, and no correction appearng the crew of the Outlaw, in fairless to the boat, wish to make a statement and put their position fairly pefore their friends.

The race was to have been twice around, but we were late in starting and the breeze was dying out; the Baden-Powell carried away her peak halyard after the race was started and we voluntarily came back. It was then much later, and just be-fore firing the first gun for the second start we were told by the judges to ro only once around, and received no other instructions. We were thirty-five seconds behind at the start. We set our balloon jib and topsails and carried them on the first two legs, and when we came to the beat home we nook them in stowed them away and inrove our extra halyards. We passed the Baden Powell and came in one minute and ten seconds ahead, beating hem in all one minute and forty-five seconds actual sailing time. As we counded the home buoy we were told by the judges to go round again but we refused to do this, as we could not set our canvas. The Baden Powell was then hailed and called back by the judges, but went around again. She did not finish either round within

the time limit fixed for the race. The muddle was not our fault. We had won according to our instructions

but offered to sail it over or abide by the judges'decision .. We are thankful for the offer of Mr Phillimore, to put the flag up again, but we cannot accept in that way to sail for a flag already won and awarded.
