U. S. AND CANADA.

Reciprocity Not to Be Negotiated By Bryce.

London, March 27.—Replying in the House of Commons yesterday to a question of Mr. Arnold Forster, a former war secretary, Foreign Secretary Grey said the general regulations respecting commercial reciprocity between the United States and Canada, which had been left unsettled in 1896, had not been re-opened in the recent negotiations of Ambassador Bryce and would form no part of them.

Secretary Grey had not heard that Secretary Root proposed the adoption by Canada of the United States tariff against Great Britain and all other countries and then the establishment of free trade between Canada and the United States.

Mr. Bryce had been empowered to do his best to settle the outstanding questions between the United States and Canada. Negotiations respecting commercial reciprocity would technically form part of such outstanding questions, but neither the United States nor Canada, so far as Great Britain was aware, had shown any desire to reopen the matter.

WILL TRY TO LIFT CUP.

Famous Aeronauts Who Will Represent Great Britain In Race.

Although four men have been chosen as the British team for this year's Coupe Internationale, Professor Huntington and Mr. Perrin are certain to be the actual team.

Mr. A. K. Huntington is professor of metallurgy at King's College, London. He first showed his interest in

ballooning about five years ago. Since then besides making private experiments, he has made between forty and fifty public ascents. He took part in last year's Coupe Internationale. For the last two years Professor Huntington has devoted a great part of his spare time to solving the question of obtaining a reliable aeroplane. His models are numerous; his experiments have been many; yet he is still to be reckoned among the pessimists so far as the immediate future is concerned.

Mr. Harold E. Perrin is the secretary of the Aero Club of the United Kingdom, and all the work of the organization on this side of the Atlantic with regard to England's share in the Coupe Internationale of 1907 falls upon him.

Mr. Perrin has always taken great interest in the question of locomotion. He holds the position of secretary of the Institute of British Carriage Manufacturers, which institute is similar to the Carriage Builders' National Association of the United

States. He took an active interest in the automobile movement in its early days in England, and is one of the founder members of the Automobile Club of Great Britain. Mr. Perrin has now soared higher and has already shown a personal and practical interest in his new position, by making several balloon ascents. Though definite arrangements have not yet been made, Mr. Perrin will probably accompany the English team to St. Louis in October next.

Consumption and Milk.

After five years' deliberation the Royal Commission on Tuberculosis has issued a most important report, which points to the danger of human beings contracting consumption from cow's milk infected with tubercular germs.

This conclusion directly contradicts the theory of Dr. Koch, who recently startled the scientific world by the statement that bovine and human tuberculosis was not inter-communicable—in other words that human beings could not contract consumption from eating meat or drinking milk.

The main conclusions at which the Commission arrived at were these: "There can be no doubt but that in a certain number of cases the tuberculosis occurring in the human subject, especially in children, is the direct result of the introduction into the human body of the bacillus of bovine tuberculosis, and there can also be no doubt that in the majority at least of these cases the bacillus is introduced through cow's milk. Cow's milk containing bovine tubercle bacilli is clearly a cause of tuberculosis, and of fatal tuberculosis in man."

The facts indicate that a very large proportion of tuberculosis contracted by infection is due to tubercle bacilli of bovine source. A very considerable amount of disease and loss of life, especially among the young, must be attributed to the consumption of cow's milk containing tubercle bacilli.

"Our results point clearly to the necessity of measures more stringent than those at present enforced being taken to prevent the sale or the consumption of such milk."

The least interesting portion of the report is a brief critical and historical sketch of the whole question of consumption research. Here unflinching tribute is paid to Dr. Koch for his remarkable discovery of the "bacillus tuberculosis." At the same time, what are now considered the mistakes of that scientist are duly recorded.

SLAVIC SOCIETY CUP

HEAD OF MOVEMENT MAKES PRESENTATION TO ROOSEVELT.

Recognition of His Efforts in Behalf of Peace—Trophy Stands Two Feet High—General Count Tcherep-Spiridovich Travels From Moscow to Bring the Gift—Fine Example of Slavic Silversmith's Art.

Gen. Count Arthur Tcherep-Spiridovich, president of the Great Slavic Society in Moscow and head of the Slavic movement in Europe, has presented President Roosevelt, in behalf of the Slavic society, a handsome cup, in recognition of Mr. Roosevelt's efforts in bringing about world peace. The presentation recently took place in Washington.

What the Slavic society is hardly realized in Canada, though it is estimated that in America the number of persons of Slavic origin or immediate ancestry is something like ten millions.

Though the society is in a sense a secret order, and has five thousand se-

cret agents scattered about Europe, its policy is of a peaceful order, though some European Governments have not always regarded it in that light.

Gen. Tcherep-Spiridovich has been the recipient of many medals for bravery. He has a brother who is a member of the Tsar's bodyguard. His family is descended from the former Dukes of Lithuania, one of whom for his bravery in the battle of Gruznwald, in 1410, received the appellation of "Tcherep," which means "daring."

The cup which was presented to President Roosevelt is a fine example of Slavic art. It was made in Moscow by the most skilled silversmiths, and is of silver and gold, ornamented with enamel. The base is three feet high. Standing two feet high, it is inscribed in Slavic characters and bears also the initials "T. R." Cups of this sort are presented, it is said, only to crowned heads and great rulers.

AMEER RETURNS HOME.

Has Learnt Many Things During His Stay in India.

After more than a two months' visit to India, the Ameer of Afghanistan, Habibullah Khan, has recrossed the frontier into his own country, and has started for Kabul. His Majesty, who was for the first time in India, was for the first time officially designated as "Your Majesty," in a telegram of welcome from King Edward when the Ameer entered India, which is regarded here as significant.

While no proposals of a political or military character have been made on either side, and no modification of the British Afghan relations as established by the treaty of Kabul in 1905 was suggested, the visit is regarded as further welding the ties which make Afghanistan a buffer state against a possible Russian advance on India.

The Ameer, during his stay in India, went up in balloons, became a keen motorist, as a result of which he has taken several automobiles back to Afghanistan with him; developed an immense liking for playing bridge whist, and made the Afghan courtiers learn the game, so that he could play it at Kabul.

The Ameer sent from the frontier a message, the original of which was written in his own hand, which has caused marked satisfaction among the Indian officials. The message begins: "In the name of God, and goes on to declare that 'during my short tour of India I have made more true friends for Afghanistan than could have been made in twenty years if I had not paid the visit.' The Ameer concludes with expressing the significant desire that his message be published in the newspapers 'for the information of the whole world.'"

For the Royal Baby.

Word from Madrid says that preparations for the reception of the expected royal heir are about completed. The statement says the baby's cradle will be the one in which Alfonso XII. slept. It is surmounted by two pillars bearing the royal crown of Spain, the pillars support columns of old Brussels lace. The coverings are hand-embroidered in garlands of rosebuds and butterflies. At the request of Alfonso, all the baby's clothes are of Spanish make, a great portion of it made by the Spanish royal family since the days of Ferdinand VII. The christening robe, which is made by a Madrid firm, is lavishly adorned with lace.

TO REFOREST SPRUCE.

Paper Required For Printing Daily News May Run Short.

A Timber Valuator writes regarding the pulpwood situation: "In view of the growing scarcity of forest products many substitutes have been offered and suggested to take the place of wood for building material, yet, notwithstanding the near approach to a timber and lumber famine, and the high prices now being paid for lumber, it is still the cheapest, safest and best building material. Brick, cement and steel have been experimented with to a considerable extent, but nothing has yet been discovered or invented that will serve to check the increasing demand for lumber as a building material. When I was a boy boys were used almost exclusively for making all kinds of paper, but to-day I have it from good authority that 85 per cent. of all the paper manufactured is made from wood pulp, chiefly spruce. I was recently given a list of ten newspapers per the daily issue of each of which required the product of a well-timbered acre of spruce. To one that knows approximately the total amount of raw material available it does not require much of a mathematician to figure out how long it will require to exhaust the supply at the present rate of consumption."

Almost Denuded of Trees.

Pulp mills on the west side of Lake Michigan have been getting their supply of spruce from Ontario for several years. Going east through Ontario and nearing the Ottawa River we gradually run out of the pine belt and find the spruce timber predominating through the Provinces of Quebec, New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and the State of Maine. But, like the Western States of Michigan, Wisconsin and Minnesota, they have become almost entirely denuded of spruce, even that suitable for pulpwood, with the exception of the Province of Quebec, which is now producing more pulpwood, pulp and paper than all other Provinces or States. Within the past two years there have been established seventeen pulp mills or roasting plants north of St. Lawrence River, the products of which are shipped to New York and other eastern markets. I would suggest that the Forestry Association give some attention to the reforestation of spruce pulpwood as well as to the reforestation of pine, or some day we may be short of "news" paper.

BORN NEAR BRANTFORD.

Distinguished Leader Commenced Education in Industrial Indian School.

As is generally known, Dr. Oronhyatekha was a full-blooded Indian, his parents being of the Mohawks, whose reservation is near Brantford. His English education was begun in the Industrial School, near Brantford, established for the training of young Indians, and supported and maintained by the New England Co., whose headquarters are in London, England, wherein he acquired the rudiments of

an English education. His desire for knowledge took him away from home, and for a time he studied at the Wesleyan Academy, at Wilbraham, Mass. Being without means, he had at the end of his career an opportunity of developing those qualities of self-reliance, perseverance, and resolution that have been such essential factors in the success that has since attended his efforts.

Canadians had reason to honor Dr. Oronhyatekha. He was a man who could be traced to an origin in the old lands across the sea. Oronhyatekha was a Canadian by birth. So are other able men. But Oronhyatekha was Canadian by ancestry. In this double sense of birth and ancestry he was a unique representative of his country, perhaps the greatest Canadian of his time.

The life of Oronhyatekha has left its memorials in clothing for children orphans who would be hungry, in comfort for widows who would be in want if the genius of this Indian chief had not carried the blessings of insurance into lives and homes that would have never been reached by the activity of the old line companies.

Great Boon In Trade.

Mr. J. S. Larke, Canadian Trade Commissioner to New South Wales, reports to the Trade and Commerce Department that there is a great boom in trade in Australia. The total trade produced 24,000,000 bushels of wheat, which will allow of 13,000,000 bushels being exported.

The New Zealand drought has been broken, and trade prospects, which had been very poor, are now improved.
