## LETTERS

### SUPPORTS HIS STATEMENTS.

To the Editor of The Planet:

Dear Sir,—My attention has been called to your editorial in Monday's daily, relative to a remark I made Sabbath morning, when giving a report of the proceedings of the recent General Assembly.

Permit me to give three examples of "the unfortunate inaccuracies of the press," to substantiate my statement:

1. In referring to the loss of Knox, Colborne, such misleading statements were made in the Gazette, the Herald and the Star, that Principal McLaren had to take exception to them on the floor of the Assembly.

2. Speaking of the debate on Church Union the Globe says, "The amendments of Dr. Barclay and Dr. Seriminger met with comparatively little support, and the motion was carried by a triumphant majority."

Is a vote of 64 to 124 "comparatively little support?" Is a gain of eleven a "sweeping majority," with 300 commissioners present?

The fact is that as a result of such statements as these, made this year and last, many who depend on the press reports do not know at what stage we are in these negotiations.

And several commissioners told how such reports have been used to the loss of our denomination.

3. The morning following the discussion on moral reform the Mail and Empire came out in large type with this heading, "Graft, not intemperance, is the curse of Canada. Go to Ottawa and you will find it. Canada is shamed by some men in public life who do not elevate moral standards."

What the layman who is here quoted (I did say was, "Graft, not intemperance, is the besetting sin of Canada to-day. We are not an honest people. Go to Ottawa and find out. Go to the election courts and find out. Look at the report of the insurance commission."

Is the Mail and Empire "honest" in this report? You say in your editorial "there is more than one way of viewing all actions." Is this one way? Again you say, "the press desires to present to the public those things which the public desires to see and hear." Is the above a specimen of the kind of reporting they desire? Such reports serve the party more than they do the cause of truth.

In your closing paragraph you say "surely the clergy have nothing to fear from a mere lay version of their actions." Until I read this I thought the writer might have heard my address on the morning in question, when I said there were about as many elders as ministers in attendance at the Assembly. But of course he did not. Neither could he have noticed the leading part taken by the laymen in all the discussions. Neither can he be a Presbyterian or he would know that in all our church courts the laity has equal representation with the clergy. It is this that makes our church essentially a church of the people and one of the most democratic of institutions.

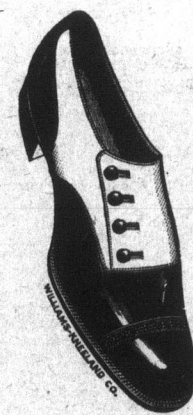
