

St. Petersburg, Aug. 13.—Grand Duke Nicholas Nicholalevitch, president of the Council of National Defence, nar-rowly escaped assassination Friday af-ternoon at the hands of the imperial guards in the guard camp at Krasnoe-

Afterward it was definitely established that the shots were fired by the First battalion of the sharpshooters of the guard, who advanced in fushes while making a sham attack on an intrenched position. 
