The Wolfville band is to play at Evangeline Beach this afternoon if the weather is favorable.

The house at Mr. Ford, on Gaspean street, has been much improved this week by a coat of paint.

There have been a good many tourists to town the past week. Acadia Seminary Hotel had a large number over Sunday.

The new fruit house for Nothard & Love has been begun. Mr. D. A. Munro is the contractor. The new building will be located just east of the Acadia Dairy.

There was an excursion from Parrsboro on Friday by the steamer *Boatman*. There was a good attendance, but the disagreeable state of the weather spoiled the excursion.

The schooner *Harold Borden* arrived on Monday with a cargo of 9,200 bushels of corn for the Beaver Mill. This is the largest cargo yet received and should keep the mill running for some time.

A barn belonging to Robert Dow, at Brooklyn Street, was burned by lightning last Friday evening. Most of the contents were saved—thirty-five turkeys, a calf and a few farming implements being destroyed.
