CHILD'S PLAY TABLE CAN BE TURNED FROM TABLE TO SAND BOX.

Invented by a Clever Kindergarten—It is Little More Than Four Feet Long, Two and a Half High and of Lesser Width.

An ingenious play table for children which has been adopted by many kindergartens in this country and even in Germany in the recent invention of Miss Frances A. Greenlaw, a young

kindergarten teacher of Marinette, Wis. It saves space and time, serves as well in an ordinary nursery as in the school-room and amuses the little folk by its very capacity of transformation.

The table is a little more than four feet long, two and a half feet high and of lesser width. The varnished top is inlaid in squares, helpful in dress-making, painting colored paper, designing and exercises in measurement. When the top is tipped over on its hinges, or regardless of the dolls that crash headlong to earth, and a large box of white sea sand is disclosed. This sight usually evokes the enthusiastic mariner's song, and then the children ply their spears in the hope of finding pearls or sunken ships. The wise teacher sees that there is something new to be found each time.

But the possibilities of the sand box are endless. Houses are built on the beach to the accompaniment of the carpenter's song, the foresters sing and plants grow of evergreens, the farmer builds his dwelling far inland, and the mother hangs out her clothes on the toothpick poles. The sand box is so much fun that it is a question

whether the students will ever be willing to leave the table and go back to the common toys of dressmaking and designing.

Miss Greenlaw is a most enthusiastic kindergarten. Having a practical knowledge of carpentry, she not only invented the play table, but built the first size models herself. Her implements were saw, plane, turning lathe and a hammer, which never mistook the welder's thumb for a nail.

What the Baby Needs. The less noise a baby hears, the less he is carried about and played with for the first six months of his life, the better it will be.

It is seldom necessary to take him from his crib except for his bath and meals. The habit of tossing him about and trotting him on the knee makes him nervous and wasteful and cannot possibly do any good.

His undeveloped system calls for rest, yet he is often denied that privilege.

Children as well as older people are to a great extent creatures of habit, and they cannot acquire habits that are conducive to proper development and health of the body at too early an age.

It is during sleep that the building up forces work without interruption and the child gains in flesh and strength.

Place his crib in such a position that the light will not shine directly upon his face, preferably in a cool, quiet corner. Do not cover him too warmly. Change his position occasionally, and he will sleep longer.

Bliss For "Best" Blouses. Some girls with a love of pretty things hit upon the clever idea of making great blouses and alphas, with which she covered her best blouses and tuckers, and of flannel stuff instead of the usual plain white muslin affairs. The open door of that closet reveals a pretty sight instead of a rather funereal effect the muslin shroudings are bound to give, so that the dust is as safely dodged as when a stout muslin is the shield, is the only point that need be looked to.

Have some of the covers big, sheet-like affairs. There are certain gowns which keep in better condition if something is folded carefully about them than if they are slipped into the roomiest of wrapping sheets, so that their weight, or little as it may seem, will bear directly upon the closet hooks instead of adding its mile to dragging the delicate silks or blouses out of shape.

TEMPERANCE IN FRANCE. Scientific temperance instruction is getting a strong foothold in France. In the schools, there are now text books covering the question and the Government offers prizes for the best essays on the question, not only by school children, but by mature scholars as well. Temperance restaurants are being promoted in Paris. La Croix Bleue, the Gospel Temperance propaganda, now has about 4,000 free claimed drunkards in its ranks. Recently, 68 leading physicians, including officers of the medical department of the army and navy, in the Department of Finistere, signed a manifesto to impress on the people the dangers of drink, saying that the ravages of alcohol threaten the very existence of the French nation. And this is the country where innocent American socializers declare there is no drink problem because the 'people drink pure harmless wine.'—The American Issue.

Whisky as a Medicine. Old King Alcohol received a knock-out blow at the seance of the British doctors in Toronto recently, when Sir Victor Horsley, F. R. S., surgeon of the University College hospital, London, made the announcement that the value of alcohol, as a drug, was 'practically nil.' That of Sir Victor's opinion was apt of the gathering at large was made manifest by the loud applause which followed the reports Sir Victor as follows:

Twenty years ago Dr. Hare began a table which Sir Victor had been able to bring up to date. He displayed a diagram showing the consumption in milk and alcohol in seven London hospitals since 1867. At that time \$40,000 a year was spent on alcohol in these institutions, and the amount remained about level till 1875. It will be remembered that the present King (then Prince of Wales), was treated with alcohol about this time when his recovery from typhoid occurred. In 1882 milk cost for the same place \$15,000. In 1883, when Sir Victor was a student, the value of two commodities used in these hospitals was equal, and two years ago they had changed their relative positions, milk having cost \$50,000 and alcohol only \$15,000.

I am an example of transitional architecture myself, he declared in speaking of the two traditions under which he had his training. In the infancy of Salisbury 25 years ago £300 had been spent annually on alcohol.

Last year the cost was £7. This was due to two mere change of opinion out to an evolution of knowledge. The change began with surgery, and as a surgeon he was not prejudiced in its favor.

Antiseptic surgery had rendered alcohol unnecessary. It had been the custom when Sir Victor was a student to give every patient before he entered the operating theater, three or four ounces of alcohol. Before the use of antiseptics immense quantities were given, but this had been got rid of in the rebuilding of the hospital, as the speaker phrased it. Now there were a whole series of drugs better fitted to get rid of shock. Hancock the great chirological authority, had not used alcohol for seven years.

Sir Victor's announcement will be a sad blow to the man who takes a little medicinal. It will leave him entirely without excuse, and even if he refuses to acknowledge the fact, his friends will know that he takes his champagne because he wants to and for no better reason.
