New York, Oct. 2-In two sessions of 18.2 balk line billiards yesterday Willie Hoppe, the world's champion, outplayed the world's English billiard title holder, Melbourne Inman, by a total of 1,000 point to 151. Hoppe now has a commanding lead in the international match, which began here last Monday. The American's grand total for seven games at both styles, English and balk line, is 2,925 and Inman has 2,254.


