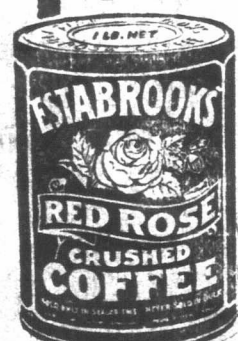

Meets in Annual Session at Tracey Mills—Very Successful Year Reported

Afternoon session—Devotional exercises led by Rev. J. B. Champion, after which the president, C. W. Manzer, took the chair. An address was given by the Gen. Sec., Rev. W. A. Ross, on "The Peculiar Needs of Carleton Co." Needs: 1. All the people. 2. Organization. 3. Lesson. Seventy per cent of the Protestant people in the county are outside of the Sunday Schools. He advocated having a "Go to Sunday School Day" and get all the people you can to attend Sunday School on that day. Would like to see three Superintendents for each school—the regular Superintendent, a Superintendent of absentees and a Superintendent of the prospective Sunday School. Graded lessons are demanded in the modern Sunday School. Four great thoughts to centre teaching about: food, light, exercise, atmosphere or environment.

Evening session—Devotional exercises led by Rev. G. S. Helps. Rev. Rev. W. J. Hurlow gave an address of welcome in his usual hearty and inspiring way. He said he was a Christian first and a Baptist afterwards and dwelt on the unity of all denominations in Sunday School work. C. W. Manzer made a reply. Rev. Samuel Howard then gave an address on "Sunday School Evangelism." Rev. W. A. Ross gave an address from the text: "How shall I go up to my father and the lad be not with me?" Three influences on child's life: home, church, community. Children learn more in the first 6 or 7 years of their life than in all the rest. If Godlessness, carelessness and indifference are in the home the child just absorbs these ideas and is not to blame for them. All we have got to do to bring back Prussianism is to fail to teach the boys and girls of Carleton county.

Wednesday a.m.—Rev. G. S. Helps led the devotional exercises. Reports were received from the secretary, treasurer and department of superintendents. The treasurer's report showed a balance from last year of \$99. Receipts \$247.26. Paid to Association \$222.41. Balance due Association \$52.59. Cash on hand \$177.30.

Some schools not having reported the Secretary was not able to give a report for the whole county.

Afternoon session—Led by Rev. F. A. Wightman. Installation of officers by Rev. W. A. Ross. New President takes the chair. Teacher Training Conference led by Rev. W. A. Ross. All denominations have agreed to wipe off

the slate the old Teacher Training courses. The new plan is a 3 years course of 120 lessons with a diploma at the end. Exams every 3 months.

Mrs. S. S. Miller read two papers on Missions; one for parish officers and one on China. S. J. Parsons gave a blackboard lesson to the children of the day school. Rev. M. H. Manuel gave an address on Teacher Training; 4 bees or thoughts which used well will do good, used wrong will sting:

1. Be ready.
2. Be there.
3. Be willing.
4. Be hopeful.

Evening session—Led by Rev. W. J. Hurlow. The report of the Credential Committee showed that 45 delegates had registered; 9 pastors present; 2 Supts.; 13 teachers, 5 secretaries, 24 United Baptists, 6 Union, 4 Adventist, 3 Presbyterians, 2 Reformed Baptists and 4 Methodists.

C. W. Manzer gave a talk on "Hints on Teaching." Addresses by Rev. G. S. Helps and Rev. W. A. Ross. The convention closed by singing National Anthem. Attendance at evening session about 200.

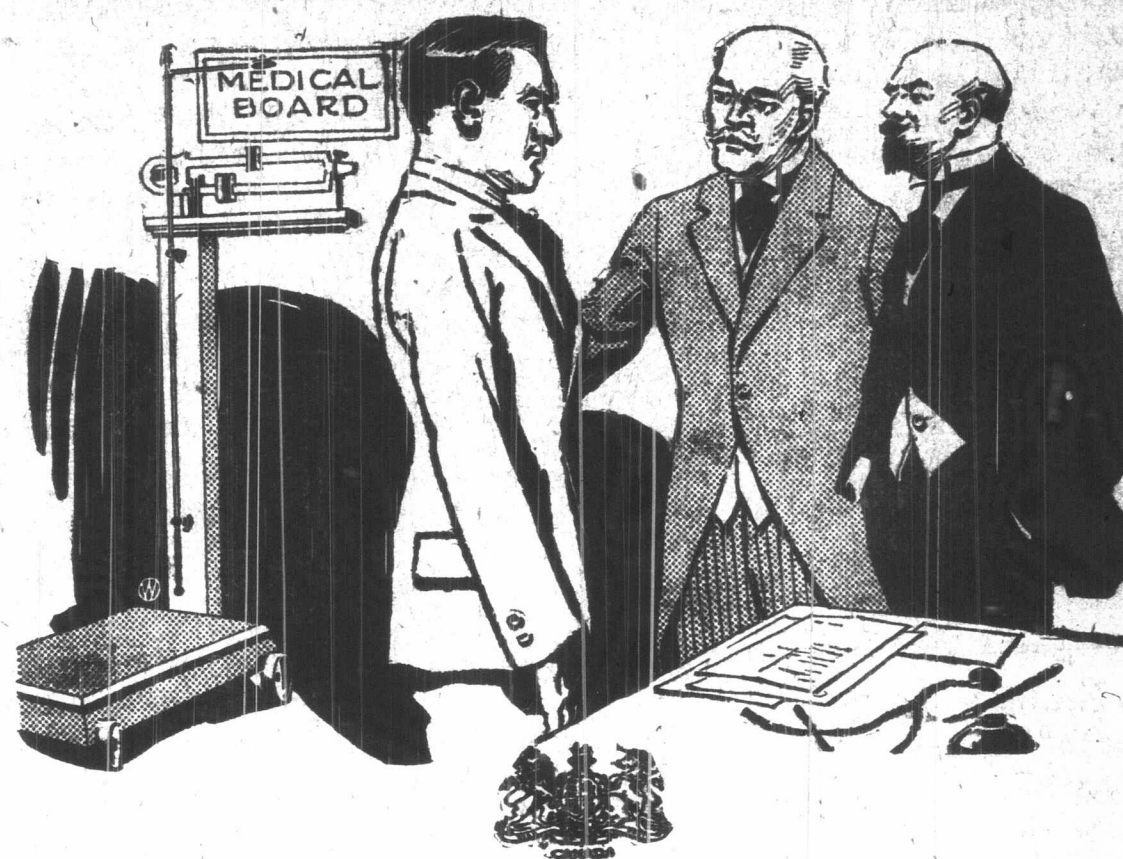

These Men Will Help You Decide

Are you liable to be selected for service under the Military Service Act?

The answer to this question is being made readily available for you. Remember that the first class to be called includes only men between the ages of 20 and 34, both inclusive, who are unmarried or widowers without children, those married after July 6, 1917, being deemed single for the purposes of the Act.

Medical Boards are now being established throughout Canada. These Boards will examine, free of charge and obligation, all men who wish to be examined as to their physical fitness for military service. They will tell you in a very short time whether your

physical condition absolves you from the call or makes you liable for selection.

It is important that you obtain this information as soon as possible. A certificate of unfitness from a Medical Board will secure for you freedom from responsibility under the Military Service Act from any Exemption Tribunal. A certificate of fitness will not preclude an appeal for exemption on any ground.

In order that you may be able to plan your future with certainty, visit a Medical Board as soon as possible and find out if you are liable to be selected. Your family and your employer are interested as well as yourself.
