WERE RESCUED IN MID OCEAN

Kirkwall, Scotland, Jan. 4.—Seven persons, the entire crew of the American bark *Pilgrim*, with the exception of the mess boy, who was drowned, were landed here today by the Norwegian steamer *Thelma*, having been rescued in mid-Atlantic three weeks ago. The *Pilgrim* was bound from Newport News for Buenos Ayres when she encountered heavy weather and was thrown on her beam ends through the shifting of ballast. Her masts were cut away but this did not right her. The mountainous seas also swept the bark's boats away.

In response to the signals of distress sent up by the *Pilgrim*, the *Thelma* steamed as close as she dared to venture and the crew of the disabled vessel swam to the Norwegian boat.

News was received in the city Sunday of the death of Silas B. Yull, which took place on January 1 at New Westminster. The late Mr. Yull was well known in Nanaimo about twenty-five years ago, having conducted a jewelry business on the site of the present Gibson block on Commercial street. On leaving this city he went to the mainland, finally set-

ting in New Westminster. He leaves a widow to mourn his loss. The remains will be brought to Nanaimo today for burial, the funeral taking place Wednesday from Jenkins' Undertaking parlors.

DEATH SENTENCE REVOKED.

London, Jan. 4.—A despatch from Berne, Switzerland, says: "I learn that the death sentence on Private William Lonsdale, a British prisoner of war condemned at Dohertz, Germany, will not be carried out, but that it was passed with the object of terrifying the prisoners of war, who, according to the Germans, are not very amenable."
