FRED MERKLE UNDER BAN.

Fred Merkle, first baseman of the Giants, is the first ball player to come under the ban of the new amateur ruling of the United States Golf Association. Merkle recently competed in a tournament at Ormond, Fla., and returned the best score in the qualifying round. The refusal of the officials of the club to recognize Merkle as an amateur and the subsequent appeal to the national organization resulted in Merkle being barred from taking part in amateur events. Professionalism in baseball was given as the reason. Recently Tillie Schaefer of baseball fame was reinstated as an amateur after declaring that he would no longer play professional baseball.

BRITAIN'S DOMINANT POSITION.

Great Britain has lost not an inch of territory. She has added an enormous territory contiguous to her former estate in South Africa. Her navy is larger and more efficient than before the war. For the first time in her history she has a huge army. Her internal economic organization is being reformed and from an aggressive nationalistic point of view undoubtedly greatly strengthened. The human wastage of war has not been relatively great. Socially and politically there is every reason to believe she will get rid of some of her worst weaknesses. Her Empire has demonstrated an astonishing loyalty. In short, Great Britain now seems to be on the threshold of a period of renewed and enlarged power. Unless we are wholly deceived by observable facts, she will tower higher above her rivals than ever and be able to take easily the dominant part in the vast reconstructive process which will follow the war.

U. S. TROOPS IN MEXICO

San Antonio, Tex., April 24.—Secretary Baker should be in receipt of a report before night from Major-General Scott, chief of staff, that may assist the administration in deciding whether to withdraw the American troops or send them farther into Mexico.

Major-General Funston has received reports showing movements of Carranza troops in the district penetrated by Brig-General Pershing, and orders have been sent to Brig-General Pershing that authorize him to prepare for any aggression on the part of Mexicans. Carranza officials have given plausible reasons for moving the forces of Gen. Arnulfo Gomez eastward from Sonora, the troops of Gen. Luis Huertara south from Chihuahua to Parral and a considerable force towards Casas Grandes, but should the war office at Mexico City decide later to use these same forces to prevent further American military operations Brig-General Pershing will be prepared for any emergency.

Until late last night Major-General Funston and Major-Gen. Scott discussed the developments of the pursuit of Villa that began with promised co-operation by Carranza troops and ended, or practically ended, with a warning to Col. Brown at Santa Cruz by a Carranza official that he must not advance south of that point.

The chief of staff was told of the difficulties encountered in transporting supplies to the stations along the line of communications and of the failure to obtain proper service over the railroads.

Brig-General Pershing's reports, which are said to contain recommendations that radical changes be authorized, probably will be gone over carefully today. None of the reports received from the front over night indicated renewed offensive activity.

PREP AT HELIGOLAND

Heligoland is in a state of "nervous expectation" fearing a British attack, says the London Daily Mail. In all directions torpedo craft with lights out cross each other, recross, and interchange signals incessantly, being on tenterhooks meanwhile through fear of British submarines and fleet above-water craft. Lights, too, ashore, send signals that are constantly answered by flashes from the sea.

The approaches to Heligoland at night are kept in pitchy darkness, and the whole routine of rigorous precaution is never relaxed. No civilian is ever seen ashore, certain former civilian engineers and skilled mechanics whose services are required being attached to the garrison, or, rather to the German Admiralty, in whose hands the fortress now is.

The only women allowed in it are some half dozen nurses belonging to the hospital staff.

But from morning to night the work of improving the fortifications goes on uninteruptedly. The Krupp steel-armoured turrets, with their heavy guns, though of a different thickness and calibre from those of Liege and Antwerp, are no longer depended upon, not being considered capable of replying effectively to the 15-inch guns of the Queen Elizabeth and her consorts, and they have therefore been superseded by the heaviest fortress weap-

ons Krupp turns out, both in guns and howitzers.

The fear of danger from the air—reasonable enough no doubt so far as the future is concerned—is evidenced by the numerous and powerful anti-aircraft guns and the system of giant searchlights worked in connection with these.

In fact all the lessons taught in the Russian campaign and the attack on the Dardanelles are being carefully utilized here: while the whole island seems filled with the naval officers, seamen and marines composing the garrison.

WHY ADVERTISE?

There are still some merchants who have not found a reason even yet. They are not convinced that at any time it pays to Advertise, but when times are good they may take a chance. Come hard times they stop at once.
