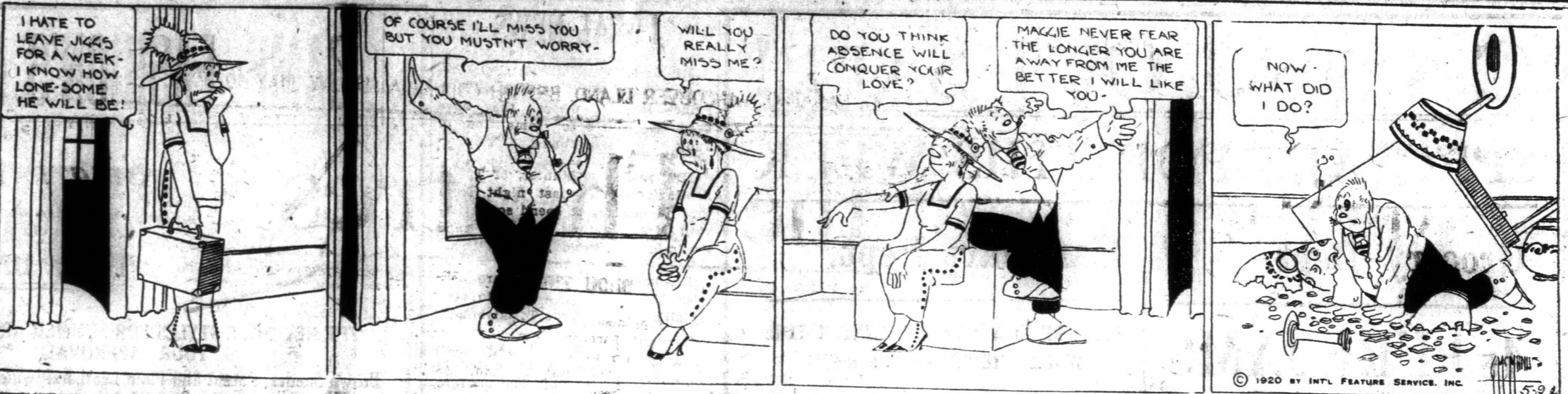
Diversion and Use

Autobiography—18
Babies in Books

My dad has always wanted to write a baby book. He says every doctor who amounts to anything is supposed to get out a baby book sooner or later. Dad has a very fetching title all picked out for his book, and he is only waiting now for the right publisher to turn up. The title father intends to use for his book is "What I Don't Know About Babies." I should think that would appeal to any live publisher. But it doesn't. No, they all shake their heads over it and say: "No doubt it would be a monumental work, but we are not in a position to undertake the publication of exceptionally large volumes." But, shucks, father does not despair; he is young yet.

Some people imagine it takes a lot of knowledge for a doctor to write a book about babies. On the contrary, it is a mere pastime. You ought to see my father writing books about babies, colds, dandruff, eczema and everything. Why, all he has to do is spread open all the books he has on the subject, take a composite squint at them, and dive right in. The publishers insist on having books made that way. The reviewers do, too. Writing a book is nothing worth mentioning. That is why the author receives from five to ten per cent and somebody else takes the rest of the money spent for a book. Authoring is the least important part of the making of a book. Book babies make us babies in real life look like pickers. A baby in a book is like an automobile in a catalogue; it looks a long sight better than it works. I'd rather be I than any baby in any of father's books, and he has a raft of different baby books all full of just about the finest babies you ever heard of and finer than you ever saw. In order to compare anywhere near favorably with the average run of book babies a fellow would have to be so good and sweet he would never keep through fly time.

Father has selected out of all the baby books a handful which he keeps and recommends. The others he has given me to play with. The best baby book any one can buy, until father's is published, is probably "Care for the Baby" by Dr. J. P. C. Griffith of the U. of P. This book is published by W. B. Saunders Co., Philadelphia, and it is a big twelve shillings' worth for \$1.50, if you've got a baby here or coming.

Another one father suggests is "Our Baby," by Dr. Ralph O. Clock and some 25 per cent of the alphabet. It is published by D. Appleton & Co. New York, for \$1.25 and the happiness of babies. In spite of Dr. Clock's alphabetical impediment: his

advice for baby and mother is a simple, clear and—here is something really rare in baby books—up to the minute.
For the very poor, one might say the niggardly, father has still a third book to recommend: "The Care and Feeding of Children," by Dr. L. Emmett Holt. D. Appleton & Company publish this book, too, and although it is hard to believe it, for only six shillings, which is seventy-five cents in our money.

QUESTIONS and ANSWERS
On Going to Court

It may interest you to know that certain articles you have recently printed stated off a bitter lawsuit. The writer had fully determined to bring an action for malpractice against two leading surgeons and an internist with a wide reputation. It was all a misunderstanding, and your explanations made it perfectly clear. You have a knack which one could wish more of your profession might acquire of explaining things in words a mere layman can understand. (P.)

Answer—Probably four-fifths of all such lawsuits are founded on false premises, either misunderstanding or wilful desire to have a fancied revenge. The majority of all malpractice suits are brought for fractional cases—there being a popular notion that if a fractured member is not restored to its pristine beauty and usefulness the doctor must have maltreated the case. Eliminate these suits, and fake actions brought by people who simply hope to evade paying the physician's bill, and the courts would enjoy a deserved rest.

No Substitute for Milk.
Is there any substitute for milk and butter in the diet of a boy 14, and a girl 11 years old? Would a diet of bread, oleo, jam, coffee, meat soup or meat three times a week, fresh fruit and cereal home cooked for breakfast, fresh vegetables daily be all right for such children? (West 11th).

Answer—In my opinion there is no substitute for fresh milk and butter in the diet of persons under 25 years of age. The diet you mention is all right except that butter should be used instead of oleo, each child should have at least one pint of fresh milk every day, and no coffee or tea should be given children under 16. Cocoa may be allowed children over 12 years, though the less cocoa and the more, milk the better.
