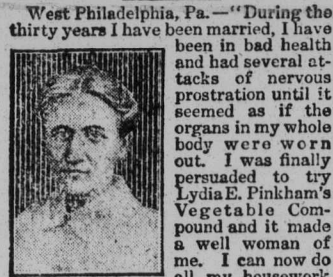

Mr and Mrs Frank Jonstone and son Archie have moved from this place to Montserrat where they have purchased a farm.

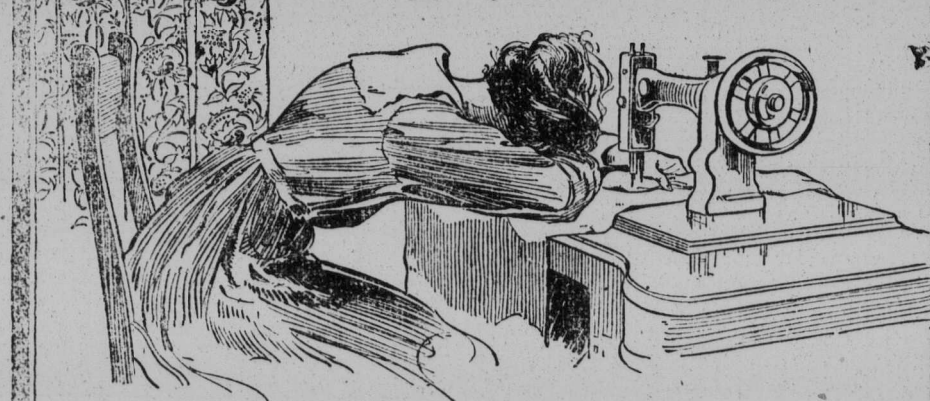
Mrs Donald McDuff returned on Monday evening after spending a few days at her old home in Marysville.

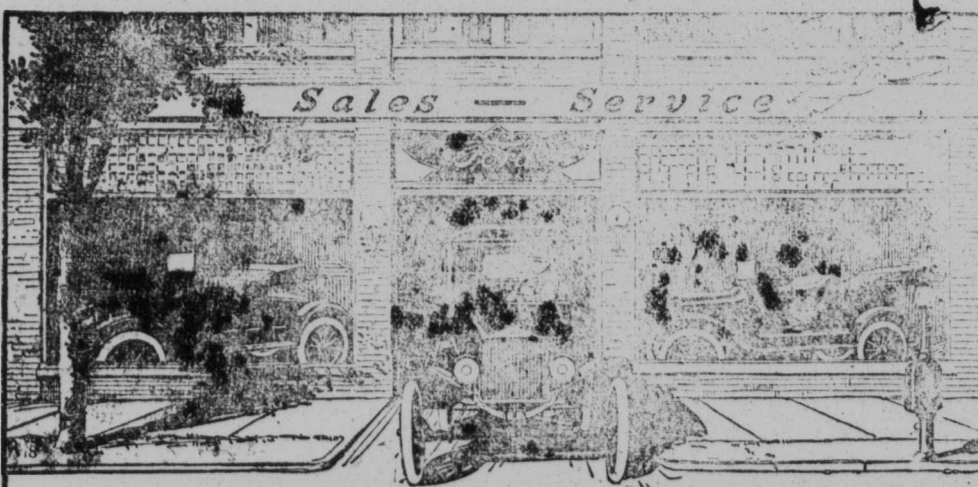
