LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

The Stanley removed her traps on the Georgetown-Pictou route this morning.

Misses Burpee, Thomas & Co., general hardware merchants of St. John, have assigned for the benefit of their creditors.

James Harris, of Weymouth, N. B., was instantly killed Thursday while cutting in the woods back of there, by a falling tree striking him and crushing his body to the ground.

Hon. Kenneth Henderson, M. P., died Saturday at his residence at Birch Hill, aged 83 years. He was a prominent figure in Island politics previous to Confederation.

The Annapolis Press says that the Nova Scotia Legislature intends passing a measure which will wipe out the "gunning competition" fairs in that Province, and make the practice unlawful.

BRETT LOBB, a witness in a case for the violation of the Liquor Regulation Act, heard Friday, was immediately after giving evidence charged with perjury and remanded to jail. Her hearing comes up this morning.

The Post Office Department has issued a large postal card (one cent) and a five cent letter card, perforated and gummed, both most useful and what the public have been wanting. There is also an issue of 30c and 50c stamps. These stamps bear the Queen's head in her widowhood. The first supply was sent out last week.

OTZWA is a Danish newspaper. It is called Dannebrog, and is the first publication in Canada printed in the Danish language. The steady yearly increase of the Scandinavian element in the city of Ottawa and surrounding districts, and the always increasing number of inquiries from the other countries respecting Canada as a field for immigration, led to the establishment of the paper. O. A. Meyer & Son are the publishers.

THREE men now in Pictou for a week past awaiting the Stanley to cross to Georgetown, says the Pictou Journal. They were chopping wood at or near Bridgeville or Sunny Brae. They have taken for sub-contractors who have taken their jobs so low as not to be able to pay their men.

There is utter distrust among the men who have so far to return home to P. E. I. If the steamer would take them around the Capes coast much more.

The sittings of the March term of the County Court of Queen's County will be held as follows:—1st Circuit at Eldon, Belfast, Tuesday, March 7th; 2nd Circuit at Bonshaw, Friday, March 10th; 3rd Circuit at Dunstaffnage, Tuesday, March 14th; 4th Circuit at New Glasgow, Friday, March 17th; 5th Circuit at Clifton, New Charlottetown, Tuesday, March 21st; 6th Circuit at Georgetown, Tuesday, March 28th. Saturday, March 18th is the last day for serving summonses for the Charlottetown Circuit.

The three-year-old son of Mr. Allan D. McDonald, of Peake's Station, was drowned to death Sunday. A little fellow was left in care of the family while the other members of the family were absent at Church. The former had occasion to go to the well for water, and when he returned he found his little brother enveloped in flames. The child was terribly burned and lingered about an hour after the accident in intense agony before death came to his relief. It is thought that the child fired his clothes with matches, which he found during his brother's absence at the well. The child's parents have the deep sympathy of the community.

Rev. P. A. McLEOD, of Kelly's Cross, Sunday evening delivered the opening sermon of the Lenten course in St. Dunstan's Cathedral. The sacrament of Baptism was administered. There was a large congregation present, among the number being many non-Catholics. The preacher professed his discourse with a brief review of the sacraments, explained why seven only were instituted, and showed the sacredness and how general welfare depended upon its administration was fully explained. The preacher closed by showing the necessity there was for its prompt administration and exhorted his hearers to remain in this duty. Next Sunday evening the sermon will be on "Penance—the Priest has the Power to Forgive Sins." Rev. Ronald B. McDonald, of Ruston, will be the preacher.

Several Dartmouth college students who were not about a fortnight ago for continuing in the college halls, Friday past, their time—call in on us.

The Dominion Government sold \$1,773 worth of 1861-1862 notes last year and authorized, and will continue to issue, the sale of the like of said notes up to \$2,500. The expenses amounted to \$183.82.

Messrs McLeod & McKendrick, merchant tailors, have dissolved partnership. Mr. McKendrick will continue business at the old stand. Mr. McLeod intends starting in business for himself early next month.

Two of the City Assessors, Messrs David Small and John Harper, have resigned and yesterday afternoon at an emergency meeting of the Council Messrs Edward Davy and Angus Martin were appointed in their stead.

The quotations at yesterday's market were as follows: Eggs 18 @ 20 (sub); butter (fresh) 20 @ 22 c (sub); lard 17 @ 19 c; pork (cassas) 7 1/2 @ 8 c per lb; beef (cassas) 5 @ 7 c per lb. James Burke had new ribular, parley and lettuce on sale. The ribular sold for 15 c and the parley and lettuce for 5 c a bunch.

YESTERDAY the election for chairman and council for the town of St. John's north side took place. Mr. Richard Hunt had no opposition for chairman, and was elected by acclamation. The councillors elected were: W. D. Baker, Major Schurman, Ronald Campbell, H. A. Campbell, Alex. Campbell, James McLeod. One member of the old council, Mr. P. T. Fanning, was defeated.

A man named Andrew O'Connor, of Montague, aged about 65 years, was accidentally killed Monday evening while returning home from his farm on a load of hay. His body was found on the road and was considerably out and bruised. It is supposed that he fell from the load, was kicked on the head by the horse and then dragged about 30 yards over the hard road. He was a sober, industrious and inoffensive man, and his untimely death has cast a gloom over the community. He leaves a wife and several sons and daughters.

This arrest of Mr. Curll, a prominent Justice of the peace at Bridge-water, N. S., for alleged forgery, has caused quite an excitement. It is said there are a number of charges against him. He is at present out on bail.

His trial commenced yesterday. When Curll was arrested he was setting up the preliminary trial of another party charged with forgery. He, however, adjourned the trial of the other party, and intended giving his decision before his own trial came on. The attorney general's attention was called to the matter.

The Supreme Court met at Georgetown yesterday forenoon. Mr. Justice Henley presided. The following composed of grand jury: Thomas H. Brown, J. W. Duggan, J. W. Foran, M. G. Boyer, Georgetown; Chas. McCormack, Narrows; Alex. Smith, New Perth; Patrick Koughan, Elliotville; James A. McLean, Souris; West, John D. Edl, Montague. But one criminal case—Neil McSwain, for larceny—came before the grand jury. They found a true bill. The civil docket is small.

A FRIGHTFUL accident occurred at Moncton Thursday afternoon. A man named George L. Edgett while walking on the track was struck by an incoming train and instantly killed. His body was fearfully mangled. Both legs were cut off below the knee, the stomach was torn open, the bowels protruded, and the skull crushed. The clothes were torn off, leaving the body a mass of gore. Edgett was aged 35, unmarried, and taught school at Hamphrey's Mills. He lived in Moncton. It is supposed that he was coming to town after closing school. The day was cold, and a high wind prevailing, blew snow in all directions, and hid him from the view of the trainmen. A fur cap which he wore pulled over his ears was probably the cause of his not hearing the approach of the train. The accident was unnoticed by the trainmen.

Spouting Notes. J. S. Johnson, Saturday, at Miramichi, reduced the 20 yard dash record by three seconds, making the distance in 17 1/2 seconds. In the six days race, eight hours a day, at Syracuse, N. Y., Apple Harvey, of Pittsburg, Pa., broke the world's record for women, for that time and style of walking, by walking 500 miles in 10 days.

In the Normans race at Miramichi last week Hugh McCormack met a Michigan skater named Nordwell in a three-mile race. McCormack won in the last time of 9:55 4/5. The time for the first mile was 2:57.

Laddie, of Dartmouth defeated Wilkes, of St. John, by a head and a half, on Tuesday night of last week, in a three-mile race in Dartmouth rink. Time 11:10. On the fourth lap from the Dutch three stumbled and broke the last screw of his skate. The race was an exhibition one.

The figure skating contest, under the auspices of the Royal Canadian Association, at St. John, last Wednesday had three contestants: J. F. Brown, of Arifield, the recent champion; H. T. Evans, of Boston; F. M. View, of Dunbar. Brown won with a score of 25 points; Evans, 20; View 15.

Evans skated an exhibition mile on the Shamrock grounds, St. John, in the last time of 2:57 3/5, Norway skated as prominently as the Ice. Both Evans and Norway have started on an exhibition tour through the upper Peninsula. Evans intends leaving on a tour of the St. John's rink on Wednesday.

S. W. Brown, of Dartmouth, N. Y., recently pulled his year's record in a measured mile race in the Lawrence in a mile of 2:15. He skated 40 laps, or as the rate of nearly 100 laps in 2:15. This record was set in the last year of the 20's.
