THE CAPTURED SCOUTS.

WINNIPEG, April 20.—The following particulars have just been received of the capture of Riel's Indian scouts, Lord Melgund, with Capt. French, Major Boulton and his troops left camp on the morning of the 18th to see what was going on down the river. When about twelve miles out Lord Melgund, while foot-prints of Indians in the snow.

After about half an hour's parley with them, and trying to get them to surrender, Lord Melgund told Major Boulton to the men and take them, when Capel. They were brought into camp about 4 p.m., in a light wagon, surrounded by cavalry, and a shout went up when they were seen by the men in camp. The general interviewed them, when they said that Riel had sent them word to come up, as there were twenty there, and then forced them to remain.
