Asquith's Veto Resolutions.

After much heart-burning and severe contention, the course of least resistance was followed by Premier Asquith yesterday in the House of Commons when he introduced the Veto resolutions, which we append, in a speech, to which our cable despatches all too briefly refer. And, by the way, these two cable despatches illustrate the little regard paid to the wants of British readers in the Asquith Press compilations. They cater to American readers. More words are given to press comments on a comparatively unimportant speech delivered in Cairo by a private individual, an ex-President of the United States, than to the report of the British Premier on one of the most momentous occasions in the history of the mother of parliaments. The resolutions have for their object a curtailment of the powers of the House of Lords.

The compromise which settled the course and led to the introduction of these resolutions was the only course open to Premier Asquith, except those of ignominious defeat or an impotent resignation. The Radical section of the Liberal party and their allies, the Nationalists and Laborites, have prevailed over the Whigs of the Asquith and Grey type, and a divorce has been effected between the proposal to curb the powers of the Lords and the proposal to change the complexion of the membership of the House itself, to which the Whigs were wedded. In every compromise there is a give and take, and it may be safely concluded that the Nationalists have had to withdraw opposition to the Budget in return for the divorce to which we have referred and for the precedence given to the Veto resolutions.

The great interest at stake, the radical changes foreshadowed, and the loftiness of the theme should give

rise to a class of oratory and an order of debate rarely afforded in Parliament.

All parties are agreed as to the immediate outcome: the passage of the resolutions in the House of Commons after a fierce fight; their rejection in the House of Lords after a high class academic debate; the introduction of the Crown into the controversy, with results that even a radical of the type of W. T. Stead regards with misgivings and the certainty of another General Election with this issue pressed to the front. Unless Premier Asquith is more fortunate in his Veto issue than he was on the Budget one, the outlook for his Government will be gloomy.

The following is the text of the resolutions Premier Asquith moved in the House of Commons yesterday. "That this House immediately resolve itself into a committee of the whole to consider the relations between the two Houses of Parliament, of the question of the duration of Parliament, and the resolutions to be proposed in committee.

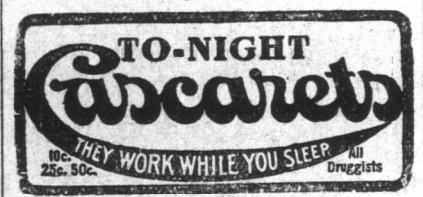
"1. That it is expedient that the House of Lords be disabled, by law, from rejecting or amending money bills, but that any such limitation by law shall not be taken to diminish, or qualify, the existing rights and privileges of the House of Commons.

"For the purpose of this resolution, a bill shall be considered a money bill if, in the opinion of the Speaker, it contains only provisions dealing with all, or any, of the following subjects, viz., the imposition, repeal, remission, alteration or regulation of taxation, the charges on the Consolidated Fund, or the provision of money by Parliament in Supply, the appropriation, control or regulation of public money; the raising or guaranteeing of any loan or repayment thereof, or matters incidental to these subjects, or any of them.

"2. That it is expedient that the powers of the House of Lords, as respects bills other than money bills, be restricted by law, so that any such bill which has passed the House of Commons in three successive sessions, having been sent up to the House of Lords at least one month before the end of the session, and which has been rejected by that House in each of these sessions, shall become law without consent of the House of Lords on the Royal assent being declared; provided that at least two years shall have elapsed between the date of the first introduction of the said bill in the House of Commons and the date on which it passes the House of Commons for the third time.

"For the purpose of this resolution, a bill shall be treated as rejected by the House of Lords if it has not been passed, either without amendment, or with such amendments only as may be agreed upon by both Houses.

"3. That it is expedient to limit the duration of Parliament to five years."



Lord Morley on Cromwell and House of Lords.

Speaking in the House of Lords on Monday, the 14th, Lord Morley said: "I once wrote something about Cromwell, and I will read a few sentences:

"There is no branch of political history that men approach with hearty light, and yet that leaves them at the end so dubious and melancholy, as the concoction of a Second Chamber. Cromwell and his Parliament set foot on this Pons Asinorum of democracy, without a suspicion of its danger. To call out of empty space an artificial House, without the hold upon men's minds of history and ancient association, without defined powers, without marked distinction of persons or interests, and then to try to make it an effective screen against an elected House, to whose assent it owed its own being, was not to promote union, but directly to promote division and to intensify it. Cromwell never thought out the scheme. Like smaller reformers since, Cromwell had never decided, to begin with, whether to make his Lords strong or weak—strong enough to curb the Commons, yet weak enough for the Commons to curb them." That riddle, which perplexed Cromwell, is still unanswered," concluded Lord Morley.

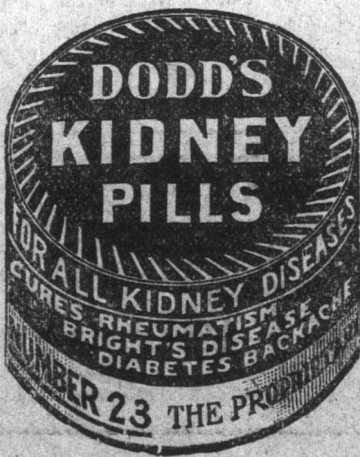
Here and There.

A Great Irishmar.

Sir Horace Plunkett, who is endeavoring to establish a national trade-mark for Irish butter, comes from a family the members of which have for the last seven centuries played no small part in the history of Ireland. The third son of the late Lord Dunsany, he was educated at Oxford, and was largely instrumental in introducing chess as a pastime among the undergraduates, he himself having been conched in the game by the famous expert, William Steinitz.

After leaving Oxford, Sir Horace dropped chess altogether, after attaining an extraordinary degree of proficiency, and took to cattle ranching in Western America, where he spent ten years, and acquired that knowledge of practical farming which has since stood him in good stead. He still possesses a large property in the Wild West, which he never fails to visit regularly once a year.

No man has worked harder than Sir Horace for the improvement and regeneration of Irish Agriculture. It was he who, twenty years ago, founded the great Irish co-operative movement.

Enterprising to a degree, Sir Horace Plunkett was among the first in this country to ride the safety bicycle. In this respect, however, he had his run of bad luck, having broken his leg in a fall from his machine, and, just as his leg was nearly healed, meeting with another nasty accident, which laid him low for several months, and which all but cost him his life—M.A.P.
