## Thrilling Story of the Sea.

**BRAVERY OF AUSTIN BREEN,  
WHO CALLED OUT "SAVE JIM,  
I'M ALL RIGHT." GALLANT  
RESCUE BY MASTER CHARLES  
DALY AND MATE JOSEPH DALY,  
OF ST. MARY'S.**

A thrilling story has reached town,  
which shows up the gallantry and  
devotion of our Newfoundland fisher-  
men. The incident happened in con-  
nection with a dory of the schooner  
Flirtation, owned by the Gorton Pew  
Fish Company, and sailing from St.  
Mary's under Capt. Charles Daly. On  
June 23rd, a dory was out longer than  
the captain expected; it was in  
charge of Austin Breen of St. Mary's,  
who had as his dory mate, James  
Yetman. Capt. Daly became uneasy  
as the dory had not returned with the  
rest. He then went with the mate up  
the rigging, from which they saw the  
dory coming about two points to lef-  
ward. They watched her for quite a  
time, fearing she was too deep for the  
sea which was running. When the  
dory was about a quarter of a  
mile from the vessel, a sea turned  
her over, throwing Breen and Yet-  
man into the sea. There was nothing  
to be done but to launch a dory to go  
to their assistance. It was no easy  
task with the heavy sea running, but  
the dory was quickly launched, and  
Capt. Charles Daly and Mate Joseph  
Daly got in her, and manned the oars.  
When they were nearing the over-  
turned dory, they could see Yetman  
on the bottom of it, but could not see  
Breen, but as they got nearer her  
they saw Breen alongside facing  
death very coolly. Then Breen shout-  
ed to the captain: "Save Jim, I'm all  
right!" "Fancy," reports the captain,  
"a man being all right, holding a  
dory's gunwale under water. Breen  
could easily have got on the bottom  
of the dory, but he knew by doing  
so, he would drown his dory-mate  
and himself, for a dory-bottom-up is  
a poor comfort in a sea, but Austin  
faced his task like a man to save a  
human life." This brave fisherman is  
26 years old and married. The  
dory-mate he saved by his coolness  
and gallantry is 22 and unmarried.  
This story of the sea shows up the  
type of the boys our country is send-  
ing to help the Mother Country, and  
recounts to the credit of all concern-  
ed, not forgetting the master and  
mate who manned the rescue boat.

## Says Kaiserin Fainted

At Dying Man's Words.—Wished Em-  
peror and Sons Might Suffer His  
Agonies According to Russian Re-  
port.

Petrograd, June 28.—The Novoe  
Vremya correspondent at Warsaw  
says the German Empress visited the  
officers' hospital at Posen recently  
and was carried out in a fainting con-  
dition in consequence of a reply of  
one of the officers in her attempts at  
consolation.

The officer, all four of whose limbs  
had been amputated while his body  
was covered with sharp wounds,  
lay very near death. When the Em-  
press reached his bedside and asked if  
he had any wishes to express, the  
German is reported to have said: "I  
wish Emperor Wilhelm and his child-  
ren may suffer what I have suffered."

The Bourne Gazette's Warsaw cor-  
respondent relates that universal hor-  
ror has been aroused among the Red  
Cross nurses by charges made by one  
of them in indiscreet ill-treatment  
by German officers. The nurses have  
now taken the precaution of supply-  
ing themselves with quick poison for  
immediate use if they should be un-  
happy enough to fall into German  
hands. The Austrians, it is reported,  
are shooting out of hand all clergy  
found by them during their advance  
in Galicia on a general charge of treason.

Irishman Walked  
Thousand Miles

SO AS TO ENLIST.

Saskatoon, Sask., June 26.—The  
newest recruit to the 53rd Battalion  
here is Pte. Joe Martin, who completed  
a walk of over a thousand miles from  
Fort McLeod, on the shores of Hud-  
son's Bay, in order that he might  
fight for his King and his country.

Last fall a rumour went around the  
North that Great Britain was at war  
with some one. He journeyed south  
380 miles to Fort McLeod, to find out  
that it was true, and finally found a  
Hudson Bay factor who had a paper  
announcing the outbreak of war be-  
tween the nations of Europe.

So he sold his fur and traps and  
his dogs—that was the hardest part-  
ing of all, he told the reporter, and  
started out on the long trail to Prince  
Rupert. He shot his food on the way,  
and had numerous exciting adven-  
tures.

Then he decided to come a little  
further east before enlisting, so he  
hit the trail for Prince Albert. When  
he got there he found that there were  
no vacancies, and at North Battleford,  
where he went next, he found no en-  
listing. So he came on to Saskatoon.  
He is Irish by birth, but has been in  
the Hudson's Bay country for the past  
seven years, being the only white man  
living in his district; he having lived  
with the Blackfeet for the most part.

He is a crack shot, in fact he can  
pick off anything living within a radi-  
us of several hundred yards, but he  
insists on shooting from his left  
shoulder.
