## On Street Fighting.

A letter friend has put a problem up to me which (strange as it may seem) I do not feel capable of solving.

"Is it right or just to always step in and stop a fight between two boys?"

"No particular instance has influenced me, but I have always stopped and listened and tried to find out something about them before 'butting in' and so far I have never found occasion to stop a fight. I have many times been re- buked for this conclusion, and as I could not convince my rebukers nor they me, I wish you would tell me what you think.

He Had Evidently Been Taught Not To Fight.

"Recently I overheard one boy call another (of apparently much finer character) an unprintable name. The finer looking boy looked as if he wanted to punish the other good and hard, but did not, only flushed. If he had started and got the worst of it I should certainly have helped him give the four-mouthed one what I thought he deserved.

"Again, recently, about fifty boys were following a running fight in the alley behind my house between a fine-looking white boy and a very coarse and tough-looking colored boy. I went near to see what it was about, and stood waiting to manage the affair my own way, when a neighbour came running in and stopped them without asking a word, and it looked to me like mere brute force stopping a well-deserved punishment. (For the sake of bringing out my point we will pretend that the matter was after-

wards investigated and it was found out that one did actually deserve punishment of some kind.)

Such Boys Need Some Kind Of A Lesson.

"Names are used now, commonly that our fathers or our grandfathers would have committed murder rather than pass unchallenged. I would like to have every boy understand early in life that he cannot use such terms when they are not true without a speedy punishment and that public sentiment will stand back of the boy who punishes him, and that he need not look for protection to a lot of molly-coddles who act as if fighting for a principle or a clean name were the most heinous crime at all.

"I would not write you, only, so far as I know, I stand alone in my theory and would like to know, if I am wrong, wherein the wrong lies."

What do you think about it, reader friends?

Part Of The Bigger Problem.

I don't know just what I think, because it is part of a larger problem on which my mind hasn't yet crystallized. Of course, you can easily recognize the larger problem.

That boys should be permitted to go about using offensive language, unprovoked, does not seem right.

Education is, of course, the ultimate solution of this, as of most of the problems of crime and poverty. But in the meantime, what?

It does seem as if there ought to be some other way to rebuke a boy besides punishing him.

On the other hand, "to fight for a principle" has a ringing sound—it strikes some pretty fine chords.

What do you think, reader friends? Will you solve this problem for me? I'd like to hear from any who are interested, and we'll have a symposium some day.

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## A Cavell Monument.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Sir,—Allow one who has seen a woman voluntarily on the battlefield and between the firing lines in action, to bring to the attention of your readers, the following proposed most appropriate memorial to a brave woman.

"Mount Robinson, the highest peak in the Canadian Rockies, will be renamed Mt. Cavell, as an eternal monument to the memory of Edith Cavell, the English Army Nurse, who was recently executed by order of German Military Officials."

In this connection may I ask you, Mr. Editor, to advocate or recommend through your well-known journal, that Newfoundland adopt something like the above strikingly appropriate and enduring mountain peak memorial in the oldest English Colony in America, to perpetuate the name and memory of the martyrdom of Edith Cavell, the English Army Nurse, who was executed by German soldiers in Brussels, within the lines of the German Army of occupation.

If it is possible to do so, the location should be conspicuous for its natural attractiveness, or exceptional height and proximity to a large settlement or line of constant travel between important points on the Island of Newfoundland.
