To speak of the value of a good example, is a truism. You cannot read a single moral author who has not had his say on that subject. When Johnson, to take a single instance, said "Example is always more efficacious than precept," he unquestionably meant good example. The only line in any quotation book which I can find even remotely recognizing the value of the bad example, is the one I have quoted above.

And yet in the face of all this authority, I am opinionated enough to hold it as a pet theory that bad examples have more salutary effect than good.

Which makes any one move more energetically, a beckon or a prod? A good example beckons; we admire, we approve, we mean, some day, to imitate it. A bad example, on the other hand prods; we are annoyed, we are antagonized, and we move hastily in the opposite direction.
