The C.L.B.C., which was last year affiliated with the King's Royal Rifle Corps, in which regiment it main-tained a battalion during the war, has a record of which any corps of a similar nature might well be proud. Thousands of men to-day have good reason to be grateful for the training which they received whilst members of the C.L.B., just as the city should realize how much the C.L.B., n common with other brigades, has accomplished in helping to make useful and patriotic citizens. PLACE WREATH ON BODY OF AMERICA'S UNKNOWN SOLDIER.-NEWFOUND LAND PARTICIPATES WITH ALL NATIONS IN SOLEMN CEREMONY.

Special Press Service Evening Telegram.

WASHINGTON, D.C., To-day. Solemnly placing the wreath of Newfoundland on the body of the unknown soldier in the rotunda of the Capitol to-day, three sons of that country, wounded veterans of the Royal Newfoundland Regiment in the world war, cemented the friendly feelings of the two nations. Wounded in their engagements in Europe, these three men dressed in the uniform of their regiment presented one of the most picturesque settings in a ceremony in which practically all the nations of the earth participated. The Newfoundland deputation, headed by Capt. Stanley Robertson, a banker and business man now located in New York, but whose home is in St. John's, placed in position a wreath of chrysanthemums, American Beauty roses, orchids and pink roses, bound by claret and white, the colors of the Regiment, and bearing the streamer of Newfoundland, on which the Caribou seal of their Regiment was inscribed. 
