News from Brazil.

Chicago, July 12.—A special despatch from St. Paul says that a sister of Allen Jordan, who was chiefly instrumental in the capture of the Indian murderers of the Cook family, was killed a day or two ago by her husband, an Indian. It is believed to have been out of revenge for the part taken by her brother in bringing the Cook family murderers to punishment.

Rochester, July 12.—Gilbert McLaughlin, son of the proprietor of the Break of Day House, a vile resort, while delirious, shot his step-mother to-day. Wound fatal.

New York, July 13.—The Herald's Matamoros special says: News from Monterey shows that the revolutionists are avoiding combats and occupying places from which the government troops have withdrawn. The revolutionary leaders promise a speedy attack on Rocha in Monterey.

Rio de Janeiro advices say that the sudden and unexpected dissolution of the Legislative Chamber, by order of Don Pedro, has been the constant theme of discussion here, and all parties opposed to the present ministry, whether Liberals, Republicans, or Conservatives, unite in deploring that the actual state of affairs is without a parallel in the history of Brazil.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE FIFTH ANNUAL MEETING OF THE SHAREHOLDERS, HELD AT THE BANKING HOUSE, TORONTO, ON TUESDAY, 9TH JULY, 1872.

The chair was taken at noon by the President, the Hon. Wm. McMaster, and upon motion of Jas. Norris, Esq., of St. Catharines, seconded by W. H. Stanton, Esq., of Toronto, the Cashier, H. S. Strathy, Esq., was requested to act as Secretary.

The Secretary then read the following REPORT.

In laying before the Shareholders the result of the year's business ending 30th June, 1872, the Directors are pleased at being in a position to report that the Bank has continued to do a profitable business.

After deducting the charges for management, fully providing for the interest on the loan fund, and after entirely written off, the net profits of the year, including the premium realized on stock sold to the Bank, were \$765,513 47

To which add Balance at Credit of Profit and Loss Account carried over from last year..... 5,255 31

From this deduct—

Dividend No. 9, of four per cent. paid last year..... \$165,532 22

Div. No. 10, of four per cent. payable 1st July 1872 70,708 76

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The Twelfth in Brantford.

BRANTFORD, July 12. The celebration here to-day of the anniversary of the battle of the Boyne was a grand success, both as to numbers and the general enthusiasm and good order manifested.

At an early hour this morning the various town lodges turned out and received the brethren from the adjoining counties, and along the line of the Grand Trunk Railway, when a procession was formed, and a march through the town took place. The grand review of the day was the arrival of a twelve car train from Hamilton, and as large a one from St. Catharines, so that at one o'clock there was an immense procession, which was gorgeous with flags, banners, and the usual costumes, and attended by several bands of music. After the march the procession broke up at the fair grounds, where it re-assembled at three in the afternoon to hear orations delivered by Grand Secretary Meeks, J. C. Rykert, M. P. P., Grand Marshal Griffiths, and a number of very prominent Orangemen.

THE TWELFTH IN TORONTO.—The anniversary of the battle of the Boyne was celebrated in this city yesterday by the Orangemen with great enthusiasm, and in a quiet and orderly manner. The same may be said of the celebration in other parts of the Province. The largest gathering was at Kingston, where a very cordial and enthusiastic reception was given to Mr. Johnston, Grand Master for Ireland.

THE TWELFTH IN NEW YORK.—In New York only about 800 Orangemen marched in procession. They were protected by an escort of 1,200 policemen, and no disturbance was attempted.

Brazil is preparing for war with the Argentine Republic. There were twelve cases of sun-stroke in New York yesterday.

Many voyagers are enjoying pleasant trips on Lake Superior this hot weather. The Erie Company will enter a suit against Jay Gould for the recovery of a large amount of real estate.

Grand Duke Alexis, of Russia, sailed from Rio Janeiro for the Cape of Good Hope on the 6th of June.

Reports from the country districts throughout New Brunswick are very encouraging. The hay crop promises an abundant yield. Oats and potatoes, though late in many instances, are said to be looking exceedingly well.

D. N. Brown, a wealthy fruit grower, near St. Joseph, Mich., has offered his wife, with whom he has lived over forty years, \$16,000 to sign a bill of separation, so that he could marry the hired girl, a blushing damsel of sixteen years. Mrs. Brown thought the \$16,000 of more account than the husband, and accepted the offer.
