

Meeting of County Temple, I. O. G. T., at Rockwood.

From our Special Reporter. This Temple met in the Village of Rockwood, on Wednesday, the 19th inst. The day being comparatively mild, from early morning sleighs and cutters might have been seen on the various roads leading to that village; some persons going there by the Railway. The first meeting was called to order a few minutes past eleven o'clock, by the W. C. T., Bro. F. Cornwall, of Elora. The Temple was opened in the usual form. The minutes of the last meeting, held in Elora on the 27th of Dec., were read by the W. Secretary, Dr. Currie of Rockwood, and confirmed. Reports were then read from "Beaver" Temple, Guelph, showing the number of members in good standing to be 226; "Fountain" Temple, Elora, 44, attendance very good, in a prosperous condition and out of debt; "Ballinlad," 93 members, attendance good. It was then moved, seconded, and resolved, that a meeting of delegates from all churches and societies in the County of Wellington, favorable to the Temperance cause, should be held in the Good Templars' Hall, Guelph, on the 18th day of March next. It was decided that the next meeting of the County Temple be held in Guelph, on the 24th day of May next. The Temple then adjourned until 2 p. m. There were about 140 members present at this meeting.

The friends from a distance were then provided with refreshments in a bountiful supply by "Victoria" Temple, Rockwood, free of charge, to which ample justice was done. The meetings were held in the Town Hall, which is a large frame building on the main street, and was comfortably seated.

AFTERNOON SESSION. This meeting was called to order by the W. C. T., and opened in the usual manner. Minutes of morning session read and confirmed. Reports from the following Lodges were then read by the W. Secretary:—Orangeville, this Temple has been organized about nine months, and is in a very flourishing condition, the number of members 70; "Baldowry" Temple, Eramosa, night of meeting Tuesday, number of members 52; "Garafraza Champion," attendance good, number of members 50; "Prince of Orange," East Garafraza, attendance at meetings good, members 49; "Tasmania," Eramosa, members 43; "Life Boat," Elora, had five lectures during quarter, in a prosperous condition, initiated 40, number of members 150; "Fairview," Erin, members 61; "Day Spring," Fergus, in a healthy and prosperous state, held two public meetings during the past quarter, members 80; "Victoria," Rockwood, in a prosperous state, members 160. It was then resolved by the Temple, after some discussion, to amend the Constitution, so far as relates to the election of officers of the County Temple, so that in future they shall be elected by representatives chosen from each Lodge in the proportion of one for each Lodge in good standing on the roll of each Lodge. The following officers for the current year were then duly installed by Bro. Wm. Hodgkinson, County Deputy, assisted by Bros. P. Bish, of Guelph, and Bro. V. Large, of Orangeville, Provincial Deputies.—W. C. T., Bro. I. M. Molton, of Guelph; W. V. T., Sister C. Smart, of Elora; W. S., Dr. Currie, of Rockwood; W. A. S., Sis. Anderson, of Rockwood; W. F. S., Bro. James Morton, of Fergus; W. T., Sis J. Murray, of Fergus; W. M., Bro. George Robertson, of Douglas; W. D., M., Sis. Harris, of Elora; W. Chap., Bro. W. H. Hodgson, of Eramosa; W. I. G., Sis. Kribs, of Guelph; W. O. G., Bro. Ed. Farrow, of Elora; W. B. H. S., Bro. Black, of Rockwood; W. L. H. S., Sister Molton, of Guelph; P. W. C. T., Bro. F. Cornwall, of Elora. The following Temples were then heard from:—Douglas, 40 members, hoped to be in a hall of their own by this time next year; "Oak Leaf," Erin, 35 members; Onstie, 64 members; "Dufferin," East Garafraza, new Lodge, 34 members; "Life Boat," Erin, Conningsby P. O., new Lodge, 25 members. The Temples not heard from were Ennville, the oldest Lodge in the County, with a membership of about 40; "Lill Bank," West Garafraza, members about 44; "Primrose," Cammock, members about 30. After more business, discussion, and short addresses from the new officers, a vote of thanks to the retiring officers, the meeting was brought to a close about six o'clock p. m. The afternoon meeting was the best that has been held by the County Temple, and we think perhaps the largest meeting ever held by any Temperance organization in this County, and of which all present must have felt proud, there being upwards of 250 members of the Order present. The number of members of the County Temple on the roll was 273, but there were a large number of members of the Order present who are not on the roll. The number of members of the Independent Order of Good Templars in this County is about 1,400; number of Temples 20. Besides these there are several Bands of Hope—one in Elora with over 200 members, and one Gold Water Temple for children, at Rockwood, with about 70 members, all under the auspices of the Good Templars.

All the members from a distance were again provided with refreshments by the members of the Rockwood Lodge, either in the hall or at their various places of residence, in a liberal and plentiful supply, free of charge, and which were freely partaken of. In taking a ramble around this village a stranger cannot help being struck with its romantic beauty and rugged scenery.

OPEN MEETING. After the business meeting was brought to a close, it was announced that the open meeting should convene at half past seven o'clock, and there was a difference of opinion as to whether the hall would be sufficiently large to seat the audience that were expected, and in view of a large number who were then present from a distance. Dr. Currie said he thought that about 600 could be seated, but by ten minutes past seven the hall was full to its farthest corner, and before the entertainment commenced there were upwards of 700 people in the building, those who could not get seats remaining standing. Mr. D. Molton, of Guelph, presiding, Mr. W. C. T., occupied the chair. The meeting was then opened in the usual form, Mr. Large leading in prayer. The chairman made a few remarks, followed by Mr. P. C. Cornwall, the P. W. C. T., with a few remarks, and a recitation, entitled the "Climbing Boy." Mr. Ryan, of Guelph, an old veteran in the Temperance cause, then addressed the audience at some length, contrasting the public opinion of some thirty years ago with the public opinion of to-day, and the action that the Ontario Assembly were taking in the temperance movement. Mr. Anderson, of Rockwood, then gave a recitation, "On Death," followed by a duet

by Messrs. Newby and Kribs, of Guelph. Mr. E. Farrow, of Elora, who is appointed by the Ontario Temperance and Prohibitory League, as a lecturer for this Province, then addressed the audience, and said he was pleased to see such a large and respectable assemblage, and that the County of Wellington was famous for a good many things, and he hoped it would soon be as noted for its temperance principles. Messrs. Kribs and Bouffette and Misses Newby and Kribs then gave a laughable dialogue, "Taking a Photograph," followed by a song from Mr. Broome, and a recitation by Mr. C. Maddock, of Guelph. The Rev. Mr. Flitts gave an address. Misses Smart and Harris, of Elora, gave a duet, "Zulo Song," which was heartily enjoyed. A collection was then taken up to defray expenses amounting to \$13.50. Mr. Bonifette, of Guelph, gave a recitation, followed by an earnest address from the Rev. Mr. Large, of Orangeville. Recitation, "Fire Brigade," by Mr. Boyce. A few witty remarks by Mr. Martin McLeary, of Rockwood, during which he said the best argument he could bring in support of the work the Good Templars' organization was doing, was the fact that he was upon that platform in his present state, that not only himself but all his family belonged to the Order, finishing by telling an anecdote how that soon after he took the pledge he was accosted by one of the hotel keepers in Rockwood, holding out a quarter in a tempting manner, "that they were clubbing for the drinks, and that he (Martin) should take one," Martin complained of having "a small gathering" on his left side. The tavern keeper said it was no wonder that he should have a gathering on one side, and that very likely he would be troubled with a gathering on the other side also, if he did not take a drink, but that if he would drink it would soon remove it." Mr. McLeary replied that he was correct, at the same time pulling out \$32 in silver and bills, that he had saved in a few weeks since signing the pledge, finished by stating that since he took the pledge, a little over a year and a half since, he had purchased and improved a property which was now worth \$400, and that where formerly was wretchedness and misery, there was now contentment and happiness. Mr. Geo. Robertson, of Douglas, then gave a recitation, "How Long," a vote of thanks was tendered to the friends in Rockwood for the handsome manner in which the visitors had been entertained by them, and the meeting brought to a close at half-past ten. Thus ended one of the largest temperance gatherings ever held in this County, and most of the friends left for home.


