

COST OF BRIDGES FALLS ON IRRIGATION GOVS

London, July 26.—A decision having an important bearing on irrigation works in Southern Alberta was given today by the judicial committee of the privy council when the appeal was allowed in the case of the King vs. the Alberta Railway and Irrigation Company. This appeal was taken from the supreme court of Canada and related to a dispute as to the cost and maintenance of bridges over the irrigation canals of Alberta.

In giving judgment their lordships stated they were of the opinion that section 27 of the irrigation act to which frequent reference in the argument had been made had no application to road allowances. It deals only with public highways heretofore traveled as such.

The action was concerned with two typical cases. Land at a crossing originally vested in the crown for a single purpose comes to be vested for two purposes, to some extent antagonistic both touching closely the public interest and both perpetual. The first was the convenience of wayfarers; the second was improving the country by irrigation. The first is still the primary and paramount purpose, and the second is subordinate. For the land is not freed from its original purpose by the company obtains authority to take possession of it, nor can it be freed from that purpose except by statutory enactment. The suggestion that the original purpose comes to an end on the expiration of the period allowed for the construction of the company's works, contained in the judgment is really not arguable. The obvious and proper thing is to build bridges at crossings where road allowances are impassable by reason of the company's works, and to build these bridges. Surely the party for whose cause, convenience and profit the road allowance has been infringed with the solicitor for the appellants, George Hamilton; for respondents, Blake & Reiden.

SEEKS TO DISINHERIT HIS OWN FAMILY IN FAVOR OF SPOOKS

Denver, July 26.—A sensational cross complaint is expected to be filed this afternoon by counsel for Mrs. Alonso Thompson, in the suit filed by her husband to disinherit her, and her son, and put his entire property in trust for the promotion of spiritualism.

Thompson says that he has followed the advice of the spirits implicitly for years, and has thus accumulated a fortune and it is only right to leave the property to the "spooks."

Mrs. Thompson will ask separate maintenance and will charge, according to her attorney, that Thompson, who is 80 years old, is now a gay Lothario.

Regrets His Marriage.

Thompson and his wife were Spiritualists when they met 20 years ago at a seance and still are Spiritualists. Mrs. Thompson says that, though her husband is a real Spiritualist, the shades which advise him are evil ones. Thompson comes back with the statement that the spirit guiding him has always been good except in a single instance. This was at the seance where he met the present Mrs. Thompson, when an evil spirit advised him to marry her. His father's spirit appeared to him at the time, says Thompson and urged him not to marry. He disobeyed.

Advised by Father.

The aged man says the spirit of his father advised him to establish a refuge for all members of the Spiritist elite faith; that in such a home they will be free to converse with each other and with departed spirits far from the influence of unbelievers.

Mrs. Annie Thompson whom he is now trying to disinherit is Thompson's third wife. It was while Thompson was state auditor of Missouri in 1864-65 that he was converted to Spiritualism and began to follow spirit advice, quickly accumulating a fortune.

HOW TITANIC RELIEF FUND WAS DISTRIBUTED

Montreal, July 26.—A Chevalier, the director of municipal assistance, today presented a return to the mayor, showing the compensation given by the Red Cross Society of New York to residents of Montreal who suffered loss in the Titanic disaster.

Mrs. Leopold Weiz, who lost her husband, and \$7,000, received \$1,700. Mildred Brown and Sarah Daniels, domestic servants travelling with the Allison, received \$100 each, having lost all their personal effects, and Alice Cleaver, a third domestic, received \$150. Anne Peralut, maid to Mrs. G. M. Hayes, received \$100. Maria, Cecile and Bertha Wiseman, whose father was drowned, received \$500, and Mrs. Albert Maillet, who lost her husband and has a little boy to support, \$750. Mrs. Rene J. Levit, who lost her husband, did not apply for aid as she is using the White Star company.

M. Chevalier recommends that application for further aid be made to the London Relief committee on behalf of the Montreals affected by the tragedy.

FOUL PLAY SUSPECTED

Montreal, July 26.—Formal application has been made to the attorney general's department at Quebec for the opening of the inquest on the body of Mrs. Adelard Bourdrias, which was found floating in the St. Lawrence, near Varannes, two weeks ago. Her brother, Theodore Modreau, is working on the case and thinks she met with foul play. Four of the surgeons who were on the case now remember that the woman's body was minus one eye, when found, while one side of the face was very much swollen.

Tests made on the body at the time seemed to indicate that death had not resulted from drowning. The police have secured possession of a letter written by Mrs. Bourdrias to a detective in which she said: "He (her husband) always said he would take me to the cemetery, I guess that is what he will do, so I won't let him have a chance."
