THE WEATHER.
TODAY'S PROBABILITIES.
TOMORROW, Nov. 27—11 a.m.—The depression situated last night over Georgian Bay and the middle Atlantic coast have since become united and swept over the Maritime Provinces. The Alberta depression has traveled with unusual rapidity to Lake Erie, where it is now central, and an important high pressure has developed in the Northwest. A fierce gale prevailed generally in the lake region last night, and today it has been experienced in Eastern Canada. Snow has fallen in many places, and to a greater extent in Southern Ontario than elsewhere.
Minimum and maximum temperatures: Battleford, 6° below—4°; Qu'Appelle, 8° below—2°; Winnipeg, 28° below—8° below; Port Arthur, 22° below—zero; White River, 30° below—2° below; Toronto, 29°—30°; Montreal, 28°—38°; Quebec, 22°—30°; Halifax, 40°—50°.
Local temperatures—Highest, 25°; lowest, 28°.

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LEARNING MODERN LANGUAGES.
Principal Merchant Recommends a Change of Teacher.

High School Inspector Hodgson concurs, and the Board of Education adopt the Reports submitted.

The Board of Education met Thursday evening to consider the reports of Inspector Hodgson and Principal Merchant on the condition of the modern language department of the Collegiate Institute. Principal Merchant's report read as follows: "I regret that I find it necessary to report to you that the students in the modern language department of the Institute are not making satisfactory progress. This is owing, in my opinion, to the lack of the requisite energy, enthusiasm and teaching and governing power on the part of the teachers. A change of teachers in the department is, I believe, necessary."
