THE BIDDULPH TRACEDY.

(Continued from page 2.)

Tuesday Morning. The inquiry into the cause of William Cain's death in Biddulph township was resumed at 9 o'clock this morning before Judge Robertson. The witnesses were six in number and included four of the Bennett family-John, James, Thomas and Anthony.

James Bennett corroborated the story of Mike Carroll and James Cain as to their movements around Rowers' house. Bowers told the witness that he fired the shot merely to frighten the crowd away. He admitted that it was ugliness on the part of the Cains towards Bowers that made them return for John Bennett. Mr. McEvoy here informed Judge Robert-

son that the defense was a justification for the act done. "Prove it, then," said the court, "I do not mean to justify the shooting of the man," said the counsel. "I propose to

explain how and why it was that he felt it

necessary to guard his place."
"No foundation for that," said Judge Robertson. "I cannot allow any evidence like you wanted to put in last night. I can give you several reasons, and they are all against your client. One is that Bowers might have laid out in his yard and fired at any person going by who happened to pull up for any purpose." This ended the matter.

John Bennett, whom the prisoner took from the Cains on the night of the shooting, was none the worse for the whisky he had taken that day, and did not want Bowers' assistance. Bowers just "chipped" in of his own accord, and wanted the witness to come away from the Cains as they were bad companions. Bennett denied having gone into Bowers' with the intent of bringing the rest of the crowd back for him. He denied having spoken to the Cains about how Bowers got his farm. The witness told of the scuffle and how Will Cain had lost his coat tails and was pounding the fence with a club. Bennett could not identify half a fence rail produced as the one with which Cain was wreaking vengence on the fence. Bennett was not very drunk nor very sober either.

Thomas Bennett, a brother of John, was sent for by Bowers that night to take John nome. The prisoner remained in the kitchen for a time after Thomas arrived, and was informed by a little son that some fellows were at the gate again. Bowers went out ten minutes later, and in ten minutes more the shot was heard. Bowers was met by the witness, but he had no weapon with him.
