CHASED ON A HANDCAR.

A Thief Boarded a Freight Train, But He Did Not Escape.

Buffalo, July 25.—Frank Jones, alias Frank Doll, was discovered in the act of robbing the till in the saloon of Jacob Schneider, No. 1388 Broadway, yesterday afternoon, but escaped out of the store before the proprietor could capture him. Schneider chased him along Broadway, crying "Stop thief!" Special Rider, who was in the vicinity, heard the cries and gave chase. He sighted Jones going through the West Shore and Central yards, and followed him as closely as possible.

In the Central yards Jones boarded a freight train which was going out, and Special Rider got aboard a hand-car and gave chase. He overhauled Jones at Genesee street, near the junction of Walden avenue, and the fugitive was locked up on a charge of larceny. Jones is an old offender. He served a four-year term in the Rochester Reformatory and escaped on two different occasions from that institution. When arrested he was heavily armed.

—The pipers paraded the streets last night for the purpose of getting the stiffness out of their fingers for St. Andrew's picnic.

—Sixty of London, recently appointed captain of the Port Huron ball team, has effected a revolution in the club, which is now winning every game.

—John Williams, the Lucan colored man charged with arson, who was in jail here, has been bailed. He furnished two sureties of \$200 each and gave a personal bond for \$400.

—The street railway company have been officially notified that they must adhere strictly to their agreement with the city in employing local labor in the construction of their lines within the city limits.

—The Washington Pilot's prize for the best essay on George Washington was won by a daughter of Mr. Daniel Regan, one of London's license commissioners. Notwithstanding the N. P. brand of inferiority put on the Canadian by Act of Parliament, Canadians can hold their own the world over—Hamilton Times.

—Many readers will be pained to learn of the death of Miss Alice Frezell, which sad event occurred at an early hour this morning. Deceased was of a kind, amiable disposition, and was beloved among a large circle of friends who will mourn her untimely decease. The funeral will take place tomorrow morning.

Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Liddicott and child, with Mr. Liddicott's mother, left yesterday afternoon for England, where they will reside in future. Mr. and Mrs. Liddicott have been for many years active assistants with the Centennial Methodist Church, and will be greatly missed by many friends, especially in East London, where Mr. Liddicott conducted a successful business. A large party, including Rev. Joseph Philp, of Ridgeway, assembled at the Grand Trunk station to bid them adieu.

—Tenders are being called for binding books by the Free Library Board. They will be opened by the board at their meeting next Monday night. The books acquired from the Mechanics' Institute will require a thorough overhauling. The Mechanics' Institute reading room will be closed for Saturday next. Mr. R. J. Blackwell now has desk room in the city clerk's old office, and subscribers to papers and magazines will have to call for them until the Free Library is opened.

TOOK FIRST MONEY.

The band of the London Musical Society went to St. Mary's yesterday and participated in a mammoth tournament. In the band competition it carried off first prize with 92 points. Woodstock was second with 87. Mr. Fred L. Evans conducted the London organization, every member of which did his duty faithfully.

OFFERS OF WORK.

Mr. S. R. Break, ex-manager of the street railway here, who resigned his position in Detroit rather than work on the Lord's day, has been offered several other positions, including one from Mr. Everett, which will not involve Sunday work.

L. E. Bellstein, of Cleveland, has been appointed to succeed Manager Break of the Detroit Street Railway. Speaking of Mr. Break's resignation, the Detroit Free Press says: Mr. Break was born in Canada on a farm. He learned stenography, and became the Canadian Pacific road, leaving his employment to go into the same capacity with Mr. Everett. He learned street railway work in London, Ont., and now is a director of Mr. Everett's road in this city. He will go out of the street railway business and endeavor to obtain some kind of employment in Detroit at which he can pass his Sundays in the city. He has resigned a position worth \$2,500 a year, and one that held out an almost unlimited promise of future advancement, and he has taken his chance at securing other employment that would agree with his ideas of right and wrong.
