The Fastest Trains.

Stand High. Over 69 Miles an Hour Run by a Philadelphia Express.

Sixty-Eight Very Fast Runs Made Daily in Great Britain.

The distinction of running "the fastest train in the world" now belongs to the Atlantic City Railroad, which has recently inaugurated a summer schedule which includes a one-hour train between Philadelphia and Atlantic City. The palm for fast running which was held for so many years by the Empire State Express has latterly been claimed by the Caledonian Railroad, Scotland, which was running a regular passenger train on a schedule of about 60 miles an hour.
