MISSIONARIES **WERE DRIVEN OUT**

Anti-Foreign Demonstration in Thibet -Native Catholics Massacred.

San Francisco, Cal., Sept. 14.-A special from Taccma, Wash., says: grams have been received at Shanghai that several missionaries have been driven out of the city of Paongan, situated 160 miles across the border in Audone Province, Thibet. Over 3,-000 Lamas reside there, the majority of whom joined the anti-foreign demonstration and drove the missionaries out. The latter include Mr. and Mrs. Shields and Mrs. MacBeth. For several weeks previous to the final riot the missionaries were compelled to stay indoors. Details are not known further than that the mission was destroyed and the misisonaries barely escaped by journeying secretly at night. Near Ychang and Chun King an anti-Catholic uprising was caused by the kidnapping of children. Children have been stolen almost by the wholesale by wandering gypsies, but the natives believe that they were eaten by the hated foreigners. A number of native Catholics have been killed. At Fuchow two natives were executed for circulating reports against the foreigners.
