# Invasion of Natal

The Boer Forces Pouring Into British Territory.

## Today's Developments.

NATAL INVADED. London, Oct. 12 .- Official confirmation of the announcement that the Orange Free State burghers have entered Natal way of Van Reenen's Pass is at hand. It leaves no further room for doubt that acts of war have already been committed, and that the campaign has begun. News of an invasion on the northern border is also generally accepted as reliable. It seems improbable, therefore, that a clash between the forces of Briton and Boer can long be delayed, if, indeed, it has not occurred already.

A special dispatch from Ladysmith, Natal, says that the Boers occupied Laing's Nek the moment the ultimatum expired, and are new pouring into Natal. Ingogo Heights have been occupied.

#### FIGHTING

A dispatch to the Daily Telegraph from Ladysmith, dated Wednesday, alone among the specials received, declares that war has begun by the Boers. The dispatch says: "Free State burghers have secured a train at Ladysmith, which was the property of the Government. Last night a mounted patrol was stoned by Boers. The men's orders were not to fire unless they were fired upon.'

It is rumored that Mr. Conyngham Greene, the British diplomatic agent at Pretoria, has been assassinated there. The report receives little credenc.

THE BOERS' PLANS.

This morning's dispatches furnish ample details of the situation on the frontier, and enable a clearer exposition of the military status. It now seems that the Boers intend to act in two columns, those from the Transvaal working from the north, and those of the Orange Free State working from the west, with the object of keeping the British forces at Ladysmith and Dundee occupied, while parties of Boers slip past to destroy the bridges along the railway forming the line of communication between the British base at Durban, Natal, the advanced base at Pietermaritzburg, and the front. It is regarded as possible that the Boers will attempt to occupy Estmen of the naval brigade, and the news that the Boers are raiding Zululand in the neighborhood of Eshowe is taken as a confirmation of this possibility. An easy road connects Eshowe and Estcourt through Greytown and Pampoennek; and from Greytown it is also an easy reach to Howick, to the south. If the bridges along the Umgeni River were destroyed, this would enormously increase the difficulty of reinforcing the British. However, it is still suspected that the entire Boer concentra-tion on the frontiers of Natal may be merely an elaborate feint to draw off attention from Mafeking, which many experts regard as the real objective of the Boers. A successful dash there would give the Boers great prestige

with the disaffected Afrikanders in Cape Colony. A dispatch from Mafeking under today's date says that Col. Baden-Powell has just sent a strong British force from Mafeking toward the border, with field guns and ambulances, presumably with a view of occupying advantageous defensive high ground.

#### Statesmen's Views.

ROSEBERY SPEAKS.

London, Oct. 12.—Lord Rosebery, the former premier and Liberal leader, in a letter under yesterday's date, says: "I have maintained silence because I am loath to re-enter politics. Today, how-ever, I can speak without touching politics, for a situation has been created which is beyond party polemics. I think there is much in the last three years of our relations with the government of the Transvaal to criticise, if not to condemn; but that is all over for the present. It is needless to discuss how we could best have attained our simple and reasonable object of rescuing our fellow-countrymen in the Transvaal from

According to this explanation, Lord Rosebery's fear had been that President Kruger would yield, which, from his lordship's point of view, would have been fatal, as he is fully convinced that the only road to permanent peace is the defeat of

the Boers. WILL SEE IT THROUGH. Mr. Asquith, speaking at Dundee, credited the government with a sin-cere and honest desire to avoid war. It seemed incredible, he said, that the other side should strike the first blow in a conflict which could have but one The handling of the problem by the Boers was such as no civilized country could permit, and the issue raised by the Transvaal's ill-starred dispatch was one that Great Britain could not shirk, but was bound to be taken up. A vast majority of the British people, Mr. Assuith declared, contemplated the war with reluctance and with aversion, and saw in it little or no prospect either of advantage or of military glory. It was not with a light heart that they took up the challenge, but now that it was forced upon them, they would see it through.

DIPLOMACY PUT ASIDE. Mr. Balfour, addressing the Union-ists of Haddington, said: "The crisis in South Africa has now reached the stage where diplomacy is put aside, and appeal is made to arms. Peace that good will among men. which it is our first business to culti-vate in all of Great Britain's vast possessions, has been wantonly and gratuitously imperiled by the rash policy of the Boer government. (Cheers.) A great change has taken place in the past three months in the opinion of this country regarding our South African policy. There was not then the clear conviction which now exists, respecting the true merits of the case, which is now to be decided by the arbitrament of force; but the more the vanity. ### EQUALITY FOR ALL.

"Now that the prospects of peace are finally destroyed, now that war, with all its consequences, all its loss of life. all its destruction of property, all its inevitable sufferings, is on us, we can say we never asked anything but justice, never desired anything but freedom. All we longed for is the equal-ity under the Transvaal Republic towards men of our race and speech which we freely give to men of the Dutch race and speech in the neigh-boring colonies. And if they think it worth while to imperil their future in order to refuse rights, at all events the blame rests on them and not on us, and we can feel that whatever we may have to endure before the war is brought to a successful issue, the sacrifices we shall be called upon to make are sacrifices in the interest of the rights of men and of civilization." (Prolonged cheers.)

#### THE BOER SIDE.

Before leaving for the continent, Montague White, the Boer representative, said to a reporter: "The expected has happened. I only hope the hellishness of this premeditated crushing out of a hardy republic court, where there are only a hundred is now apparent. Let me remind America that the onus of war lies not upon those who fire the first shot, but upon those who compel it to be fired "Technically, we have temporarily

put ourselves in the attitude of an aggressor; but who would not have done so when he believed the existence of his country was at stake? I think we must look far ahead to see the consequences of this war. Instead of the pacification of South Africa, which is the alleged aim of England, we shall have perpetual unrest. These very people for whom England is now fighting will turn against her in time to come and protest against her rule as bitterly as they are now protesting against ours.

'For weeks I had seen England's determination to force a hostile issue, or rather, Chamberlain's. I am sure he is the only member of the cabinet whose mind was thoroughly made up through all the negotiations. What his intentions were is evident from the situation today. Had the franchise been the chief grievance, our five-year proposition would certainly have been accepted. I have reason to believe that England enters upon her warlike course by no means a unit. Opposi-tion to Mr. Chamberlain's policy exists to a greater extent than is gen-

erally conceded. 'I have received no special instructions or news from the Transvaal during the last 48 hours, and I' expect none, having long ago received directions as to the course for me to take when matters reached this stage. I shall remain on the continent, and if anything further can be done in the interest of my government, I shall, of course, endeavor to do it, though there seems to be nothing left but to fight it out to the bitter, unjust end."

MR. STEAD TALKS.

Referring editorially to the Transvaal's ultimatum, the New York Tri-

bune says: "A hackneyed proverb springs to mind at reading the amazing document sent from Pretoria to London-'Whom the gods would destroy they first make mad.' We would not say that de-struction of the Transvaal is the divine will, but assuredly there could be no greater act of madness than the dispatch of such a defiance and virtual declaration of war. The ultimatum-assuming the cabled reports of it to be correct, comes as all the more unwelcome shock to the peaceful and moral sensibilities of the world, because it has within the last few days been growing more and more evident that an amicable settlement of all matters in dispute between Great Britain and the Transvaal was easily in reach. The utterances of such men as Mr. Morley, on the one side, in Eng-land, and the Duke of Devonshire, on the other, indicates the presence and prevailing force of a spirit of justice and conciliation worthy of triumph. Nor have evidences of good-will in South Africa been lacking.

The British war office has declined with thanks the offer of the services of the Jamaica militia in South Africa, but orders the regular Jamaica army reserve to report immediately and to rejoin the colors on Oct. 14.

PREPARATIONS. The government has chartered five more large steamers for the South

African service. Great preparations are being made at Southampton for the departure on Saturday of Gen. Sir Redvers Buller, and a great demonstration is expected. The Duke of York, the Duke of Connaught, Lord Lansdowne, Sir Evelyn Wood and Commander-in-Chief Wolseley are expected to accompany him from London to Southampton. It is expected that the fleet of transports conveying Gen. Sir Redvers Buller's army corps will be escorted by war-ships, while further dispatch boats and gunboats will be sent to South African waters. The government already has expended £5.000,000 in naval and military preparations, and have orders placed with contractors this week alone amounting to £600,000. The authorities, anticipating a serious reduction in the output of the South African colleries, have ordered 5,000,000 tons of English steam coal to be sent to the Cape for the use of the war-
