ELECTRIC BOATS.

Passenger boats propelled exclusively by electricity will make their appearance on the Seine early this spring.

In connection with the Paris Exposition, these novel boats, the trial trips of which have proved a wonderful success, have been built on the plans and under the direction of a French engineer, Mr. Placa, for the Company of Suburban Omnibus Boats, which will employ them, notwithstanding their luxurious equipment, for the transportation of ordinary travelers at a reduced rate. They will run at a great speed, without noise or smoke, and will be able to make nearly 40 miles without re-charging, managed by one man. These boats will be charged by an electric machine on the river banks at Asnières, in front of their mooring station. Particular interest attaches to these boats from the fact that they are the first devoted to the public service, that have been tried in Europe. If the enterprise proves successful, which there is every reason to expect, it will revolutionize river transportation.

Ladysmith Relieved!

The Important Event Occurred Last Night.

Gen. Buller's Dispatch to the War Office Announces the Long-Waited Deliverance.

Lord Dundonald and the Natal Carbineers the First to Enter The Town.

BULLETIN

London, March 1.—War office officially announces that Ladysmith has been relieved.

London, March 1, 9:52 a.m.—The War Office has received the following dispatch from General Buller:

"Lyttleton's Headquarters, March 1, 9:05 morning.—General Dundonald, with the Natal Carbineers and a composite regiment, entered Ladysmith last night."

"The country between me and Ladysmith is reported clear of the enemy. I am moving on Nelthorpe."

The Armistice.

HOW THE ARMISTICE WAS OBSERVED SUNDAY.

London, Thursday, March 1.—A dispatch from Colenso, dated Feb. 26, says: Yesterday an armistice was agreed upon, and both sides removed their wounded and buried their dead. The Boers lost heavily in attacking, and many were killed among the trees. Severe musketry fire was resumed last evening. It was started by the accidental discharge of a rifle. It is reported that there are 400 Boers near Ennersdale.

LASTED TILL DUSK

Winston Churchill, in a dispatch from Colenso, dated Saturday, says: "The condition of the wounded who were unattended on hill sides yesterday was so painful that Gen. Buller sent a flag of truce to the enemy, and it was arranged that throughout Sunday military movements should continue on both sides, but that there should be no shooting. This truce terminated at dusk. The Boers then opened a furious musketry fire on the British left. The attack was repulsed. Fighting continued vigorously. We will see who can stand bucketing best—the Briton or the Boer."

ILLEGAL BULLETS.

Mr. Churchill goes on to say that there is abundant proof of the Boers using a large portion of illegal bullets. No fewer than five different kinds of exploding or expanding bullets being found. He also asserts that the Boers are supplying armed Kaffirs, and adds: "I have always tried to be fair to the Boers. Now, after making allowance, it must be said that they

show in stress a very dark, cruel and vengeful underside of character."

THE INNISKILLINGS.

London, March 1.—A dispatch to the Times from Colenso, dated Friday, describing the famous advance of the Enniskillings on Friday, says: "I saw the first company waver and break before a sheet of well directed leaden hail, and not a man was left inside a moment. It seemed to me that the brave company of Fusiliers was annihilated. Shortly afterward, however, I could see some of them move, then rise and walk quickly to the rear, taking cover. The supporting company was also cut up, but not so severely. The Boers and British fraternized during yesterday's armistice. It is reported that 4,000 Boers have left the vicinity of Ladysmith for Dundee."

BEFORE RELIEF CAME.

London, Thursday, March 1.—4:15 a.m.—Gen. Buller's distinct success in storming Pieter's Hill bring the rescue of Ladysmith near.

Ladysmith is in deepest straits. Mr. Charles Williams, the military expert, says he learns on very high authority that "Gen. White's force is almost at its last gasp." "This is not so much," says Mr. Williams, "on account of any lack of provisions or ammunition, neither of which is yet exhausted, as because of the poisonous waters of the Klip River, and the evil effects of the heat on the terrain in which the garrison must reside. Even those who have escaped fever, dysentery and diarrhoea, are in a state of low vitality."
