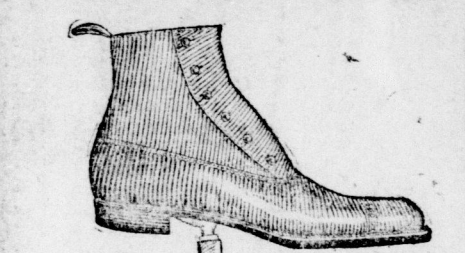

IN THE PATH OF THE STORM

Several Places Get a Breath of the Gale.

Buffalo, Chicago and Muskegon Visit
ed—A Woman Electrocutured.

Buffalo, Sept. 12.—The wind here attained a velocity of 78 miles an hour, at 3:30 this morning, but beyond the blowing down of a number of trees, the wrecking of awnings, and the destruction of a tower on one of the Pan-American buildings, in the course of erection, no serious damage has been reported.

Mrs. Rose Markes was killed by an electric wire which she touched while removing debris from her yard. Her husband was badly burned.

Many yachts, small boats, several scows and a derrick were driven ashore in the harbor. At Crystal Beach (a summer resort near here on Lake Erie) between 40 and 50 yachts and canoes at anchor were either blown away or wrecked at their moorings.

At the Pan-American grounds much damage was done.

Many boats turned to the breakwater during the night and all the big vessels have been accounted for.

Muskegon, Mich., Sept. 11.—The barometer has been falling rapidly all the morning, and the wind growing in velocity until a big sea is running on the east shore of Lake Michigan. The Pere Marquette car ferry Muskegon is three hours overdue, and is not yet in sight.

Chicago, Sept. 11.—For five minutes just before 1 o'clock this afternoon, the wind blew 70 miles an hour. For one minute it registered 80 miles an hour. The highest wind ever recorded by the Chicago weather bureau was 84 miles an hour. At this hour Chicago was directly in the cyclone belt.

SERIOUS FIRE AT PARIS, ONT

The Whole Business Section in Peril.

Many Places Burned—The Penman Woolen Mills Threatened.

Paris, Sept. 12—2 a.m.—The most disastrous fire that ever visited Paris is now raging, and the entire business portion is likely to be consumed. The fire originated in Meldrum's flour mill, a few minutes before 1 o'clock. In a few minutes the whole wooden structure was ablaze. Almost before the firemen had a stream of water playing on it, the fire rapidly spread, owing to the high wind from the west. At the time of writing the whole block on the west side of River street is ablaze. Brown's bookstore, Patton's hardware store, the postoffice and customs office are already consumed, while other business places are certain to be destroyed. F. Murray's law office, Hamilton's bicycle shop, Rose's meat shop, Banks' bicycle shop, Buckley's hardware shop, Murray's men's furnishings, Scott's drug store, O'Neill & Davidson's flour and feed, and Munro's carriage shop are in danger.

The fire has crossed River street since this report was begun, and the whole row of stores from the Bank of Commerce south to near Smith's Creek bridge are ablaze, and goods are being moved out through the back doors as fast as it is possible. The Arlington Hotel is in imminent danger. Streams of water are being poured upon the flames with but little effect. A terrible cloud of cinders and sparks is carried across the river to the flats, and already fire has started in several places there. It is feared that the large woolen mills of the Penman Manufacturing Company will suffer, as the fire appliances are totally inadequate to cope with the blaze. Bradford has been asked to send her engine and fire appliances.

JOHN FRASER AGAIN CHOSEN

As Standard-Bearer for East Lambton Liberals.

Harmony and Enthusiasm Characterize the Big Convention.

Spirited Speeches by Prominent Public Men—Policy of the Liberal Leaders Heartily Indorsed—Election of Officers.

Petrolia, Sept. 11.—The East Lambton Reform convention, to nominate a candidate for the coming election, was held at the Music Hall, Watford, this afternoon, and was very largely attended by delegates from all parts of the riding. It was apparent from the very beginning, that there was no thought of nominating any other but the present member, Mr. John Fraser, of Petrolia. Mr. Montague Smith, president of the East Lambton Reform Association, presided.

ELECTION OF OFFICERS.
The first business was the election of officers, resulting as follows:
Mr. M. Smith, Forest, re-elected president; Dr. McKinnon, of Alvinston, vice-president; and Mr. H. Williams, of Watford, secretary-treasurer.

MR. FRASER NOMINATED.
This business being disposed of, the nomination of a candidate was quickly settled. Mr. John Fraser, M.P., being renominated unanimously with great enthusiasm. On coming forward to address the meeting, Mr. Fraser was greeted with loud cheers, and was listened to attentively during the space of half an hour in which he addressed the meeting, briefly touching upon the political history of the riding since it had been redeemed at the last election. He also touched lightly upon the political issues of the day. A hearty round of applause greeted the close of his address, attesting his popularity in this riding.
